Congress is puzzled by surplus farm products production. Some reckless bolsheviks, or at least socialists, suggest that the government might interest itself in helping farmers market their surplus abroad.

Calculated to give the false and damaging impression that the automobile in itself is a dangerous deadly demon, these figures are NOT true to fact.

The Colorado river, put to work and used, will add hundreds of millions yearly to the wealth of the United States. It will supply several Western States with more than a million horsepower, and irrigation sufficient to provide food for tens of millions of human beings.

The real wealth and future happiness of this country will gain from this single project of science and consecutive statesmanship more benefit than it would from finding gold mines unlimited.

John Hulbert killed 140 human beings, his total profit on the killings being \$18,200. His line is not that of the ordinary holdup man for he is Sing Sing's public executioner, and each time he straps a man into the chair the state pays \$130. It seems easy, \$130 for work that lasts half an hour. But killing causes strain on the nerves, so Mr. Hulbert retires. Some one else can have the \$130 job.

BEN-HUR IN MOVIES AT WOODS THEATRE

Merchant Marine Needing cargoes

Co-operation of American Shippers Much Required to Make It Success

What the American Merchant Marine needs is cargoes and the cooperation of American shippers more than anything else, according to T. V. O'Connor, chairman of the U. S. Shipping Board, in a talk made recently to the American Manufacturers' Export Association.

Mr. O'Connor denied the charge that the government operation of merchant vessels interfered with the operation of ships by private capital. The need of getting more cargoes for the American ships was emphasized by Mr. O'Connor, who declared that the association and American exporters in general could greatly assist the merchant marine in this way.

He pointed out that any increase in world trade showed American ships getting more of the unprofitable cargo and foreign ships more of the profitable trade, and said the steady decrease of cargo carried by American ships in the North Atlantic trade, "the queen of the business," would mean that American ships would not be seen in these channels of commerce in eight years unless American shippers co-operated by supplying cargoes.

"I am not in favor of government operation of any business that can be privately operated," Mr. O'Connor said, "but I am in favor of government operation of American flag vessels until these same vessels can be profitably operated by individuals.
