English Test Given  
A language test or contest was given in the English classes of the 6th, 7th and 8th grades. This test was given over the entire state of Massachusetts and the purpose of it was to secure data which, when analyzed, would reveal merits, defects, and needs in curriculum and methods.  
The test is based on a summary of errors which pupils actually make in oral and written speech.  
The form used in this contest was "A School Dialogue," a conversation between two boys. There were 31 errors in the dialogue, hence the highest score a pupil could make was 31. The median for the 8th grade class was 28; for the 7th grade 26; for the 6th grade 27.  
In comparing our results with those given for other schools we find that we have made a very good showing. We rank with the high medians given from other schools.  
This test aims at the very heart of the language difficulty. It gives a basis for a definite correction of language errors.  
An Eskimo project is being carried on by the 2nd grade.
