LATE PROCEEDINGS IN PROBATE COURT

Records in Estates in Course of Settlement; Docket Entries; Orders

More electricity was generated for public use by public utility power plants in the United States in December, 1925, than ever before in any one month, according to a report of the United States Geological Survey. The report states that the total amount of electricity generated passed the 6,000,000,000 kilowatt-hour mark for the first time, with a total of 6,108,000,000 kilowatt-hours for the month — an average daily output of 197,000,000 kilowatt-hours, an increase of 2 per cent over the average rate for November. The year 1925 therefore starts with an average daily output of electricity 10 per cent larger than that at which 1924 started.

The total output for 1925 was nearly 66,000,000,000 kilowatt-hours, an increase of more than 11 per cent over the output for 1924.

Electric light and power companies in Illinois had an output of 510,711,000 kilowatt-hours during December, 1925. This was an increase of 14 per cent over the output for November and an increase of 9 per cent over the output for December, 1924.

APPEAL DENIED IN JACK DURAND CASE

Attorney Plans to Take Case to Supreme Court, Springfield, At April Term

Jack Durand, son of Mr. and Mrs. Scott Durand of Lake Bluff, who several months ago was sent to the penitentiary for three to 20 years on a robbery charge, will have to remain in the penitentiary until April at least.

E. V. Orvis, attorney of Waukegan, Ill., appeared last week before Justice Frederic R. De Young of the supreme court for a writ of supersedeas in order to obtain a new trial for Durand on the plea that they had new evidence.

Justice De Young denied the appeal and Orvis will now take the case to the supreme court in Springfield at the April term of court. Orvis had hoped to be able to obtain the release of his client on bonds pending appeal to the supreme court.
