Citizens Protest Against Physical Examination

At the request of a number of citizens whose children have had to submit to a physical examination and have had to obtain "Health Certificates" before being permitted to return to school after a brief absence, we print herewith an opinion given by the Attorney General of the State of Illinois:

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

The following excerpt is from an opinion given by the Attorney General of the State of Illinois, and is

dated December 7, 1921, confirmed September 17, 1923: "In view of the holding of the Supreme Court in Potts vs. Breen 16 Ill. 67, Lawbaugh vs. Board of Education, 177 Ill. 572, and Hagler vs. Larner, 284 Ill. 547, I am of the opinion that pupils in the public schools cannot be forced to submit to physical examination against their will or the will of the parents, and that pupils so refusing may not be excluded from such schools because of refusal to so submit, unless there is an epidemic of contagious disease in the district or reasonable grounds to apprehend such an epidemic. For instance, if there were a number of cases of scarlet fever, diphtheria, or other contagious or infectious diseases in the district or near it pupils might be required to submit to a physical examination or be excluded from school until the epidemic or danger thereof should cease. In the present state of the law it seems to me to be unwise for the school authorities to attempt to enforce such physical examinations without the consent of the parents, except in cases of epidemic as above stated."
