traffic for many years. Thirty feet wide will not do that. It could be repaved to a width of forty feet right away.

The following story by J. L. Jenkins in the Chicago Tribune regarding the proposed north shore route backed by the regional planning commission shows how the communities to the south of us are co-operating in the plan:

In co-operation with the villages of Glencoe, Winnetka, Kenilworth, Wilmette, and Evanston, the Chicago regional planning commission has been making a study of the connected highway parallel to the Chicago and North Western railroad which will relieve traffic congestion on Sheridan road in the north shore suburbs.

Two joint meetings have been held, bringing in all interests concerned with representatives of the Cook county highway commissioners and the state highway department.

Three or four re-alignments in the proposed highway have been agreed upon in the joint meeting according to official reports issued yesterday. In Evanston the McCormick road, Dodge avenue, Asbury avenue and Ridge avenue are being studied as connections for the continuous route, and each of the municipalities have been included in the co-operative scheme, which is expected to result in the first wide traffic artery leading north from the Chicago gateway.

Each section of the north through route is being planned as a local improvement by the various municipalities, and the cost is being spread by special assessment proceedings under the local improvement act. In Glencoe the wide artery matter is impending in court, preparatory to spreading the needed special assessment. Here the proceedings are concerned with the extension of Green Bay road through the center of Glencoe on a 100 foot right of way. Winnetka has two units actually completed and under traffic. A fourth unit is already good pavements, though not so wide as the final plans call for, and the fifth is ready to go forward with court confirmation of proceedings on its entire section of the route. Wilmette has acquired practically all of the new right of way needed.

The new north highway, the first in Chicago's wide highway transport plan, will carry all types of traffic. It will aid passenger car operation as well as heavy truck traffic, according to officials of the regional planning association. The pavement planned for most of the new route is a forty foot slab, eleven inches thick and made up of re-inforced concrete construction.

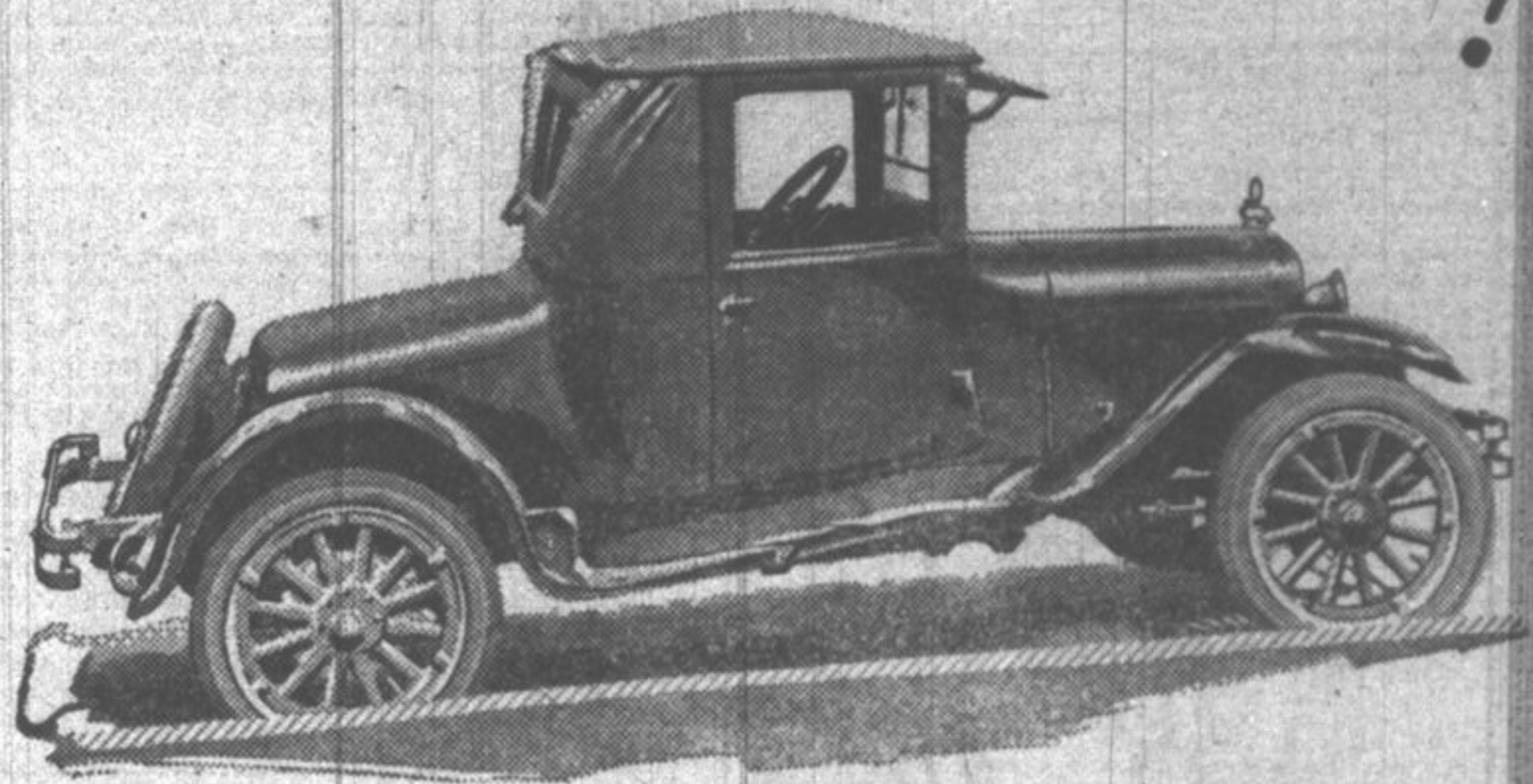
