### Seem To Be Dead Issue

A careful consideration of the editorial comments over the country generally, gleaned both from the metropolitan dailies and the country papers, indicates a general waning of interest in the World Court issue.

The best foundation on which to form a general opinion is from the comment in the country newspapers, both dailies and weeklies. These publications have refused to be stamped by the anti-World Court orators, and the general trend of comment is that peace will soon reign again in the minds of the general public on this matter. It is generally regarded as a selfish purpose created as a boom for some anti-World Court candidate for President in 1928.

The public seems pretty well satisfied with the Coolidge administration and its fairness to the general public interest; there seems to be a general pause against repudiating the national administration and the pledges and principles which it is carrying into execution, including the condition of adherence to the World Court protocol.

The press has been a great factor in recalling to the minds of the people that the World Court is not a new issue, but was submitted at the election when President Coolidge received his overwhelming majority.

There are some of the large dailies and some weeklies still publishing anti-World Court propaganda; but the great majority of the editorials of the country so strongly favor the United States entering the World Court, under the strict and absolutely safeguarded reservations adopted by the United States Senate, that the question seems to be a dead issue.

### Disarmament Improbable

According to Frank H. Simonds, American expert on international affairs, writing from Paris, there is not the remotest chance of a successful arms conference in Europe during the present year. The preliminary conference to be held, Mr. Simonds declares, will devote itself to fine spin and highly involved technical questions. Mr. Simonds has come to his conclusions after extensive inquiries in England and France.

This news will doubtless come as a shock to some of our own good people who thought that, as soon as Uncle Sam decided to join the conference, it would all work out beautifully and with little effort. On the other hand, Mr. Simonds says the Europeans cannot understand why the United States should have suddenly developed a great interest in the question of disarmament, and our stand invokes little, if any, enthusiasm.

The truth of the matter is that the European nations would a little rather Uncle Sam had not agreed to come to a conference on the limitations of arms. They don't want to cut down their armies themselves, and if we had refused to join the conference they could have blamed the obvious failure of the conference on the United States. And think what a good time our own internationalists would have had in agreeing with them.

The fact is that most of the European nations are really afraid to disarm. Each one of them is suspicious of the other, in spite of the League of Nations, and is afraid that the other is trying to put something over.

And yet there are good people in the United States who actually want us to join the League and lamblike lie down beside these nations who don't even trust one another.

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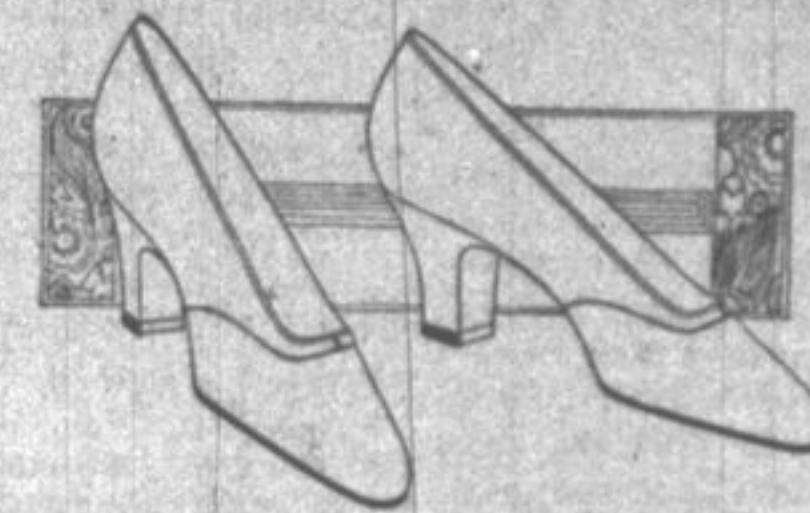
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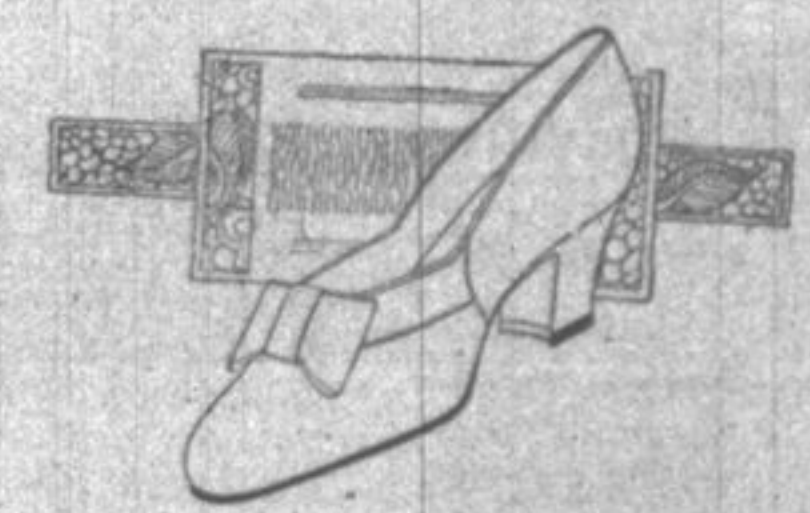
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
