NEW H. S. ATHLETIC FIELD SOON IN USE

Fine Playing Field With Full Equipment Now Ready For Spring Activities

The Deerfield-Shields high school's new athletic field on West Park avenue will be used for the first time this spring. The field is about four blocks west of Green Bay road just south of the Exmoor Country club. The grounds contain thirty acres and will be devoted exclusively to athletics.

A new cyclone fence, similar to the one around the present football field, has been put up. There is parking space large enough to accommodate six hundred cars on the east side of the field.

Grass has been planted on all the fields, while the large football field has received special care so that it will be ready for games next fall.

Besides the regulation field for league games, there will be three smaller fields which may be used for football practice and for girls' hockey.

A quarter mile track with concrete curbs encircles the field and a new feature will be a 220-yard straight-away track.

Three baseball diamonds are included in the grounds, one for games and two for practice.

Tennis courts will have plenty of room in which to display their ability as there will be ten courts for this sport.

A large skating pond covering 176,250 square feet will be used for skating and hockey. In future years, skating will become a major sport at Deerfield.

Coach Peil plans to have the baseball team play all our league games on the new field. The diamond has been improved and will be ready for play about the first of May.

The football field will be in good shape by next fall and, if everything goes as planned, it will be one of the best in the Suburban league in a few years.

It will take at least two or three years for the track to become well seasoned. This kind of work cannot be hurried, so that it probably will not be ready for use until the end of this year or the first part of next season.
