Good Roads Bond Issue Passed At a meeting of the Lake county board held last week, the county bond issue of \$730,000 for good roads in the county was passed by the board with a vote of 19 to 7. This bond issue will be voted upon by the people of the county at the coming primary election, which will be held Tuesday, April 13. In order to put this issue through it will be necessary for every one in the community to make a special effort, to vote in favor of it.

The townships which will benefit by its passage are Newport (which has not a foot of concrete), Avon, Grand, Libertyville, Antioch, Benton, Fremont, Deerfield and Lake Villa. Through the efforts of our present supervisor, James O'Connor, who always works for the best interests of the people, Deerfield avenue was paved and the present state road put through Deerfield.
