**PLAYGROUNDS CUT  
DOWN DELINQUENCY  
DIVERSION LOWERS CRIME**

**Report Shows That This Is True  
From Statistics Obtained  
In Several States;  
Good Work**

Under the influence of municipal playgrounds, child crime and delinquency are being reduced in many cities, states the Playground and Recreation Association of America. Juvenile delinquency in Lima, Ohio, decreased 33 1-3 per cent during the period that playgrounds were conducted, stated Judge Jesse H. Hamilton last year.

**In St. Louis**  
A survey in St. Louis in 1925 showed that systematic operation of public playgrounds in the city had reduced delinquency 55 1-5 per cent. "In our survey," said William F. Torger, superintendent of recreation, "we made no guesses, but based our findings on actual fact. Records of the juvenile court and other delinquency figures were checked for a period of four years with an overwhelming verdict in favor of organized recreation."

In Branford, Connecticut, after six months operation of a recreation program, there was a 51 per cent improvement in the department of school children, according to the superintendent of schools.

A single district of Los Angeles experienced a decrease of juvenile delinquency cases from a hundred to three in a year's time after trained recreation leaders conducted playgrounds.

**Des Moines Report**

Studies in New Orleans, Chicago, San Francisco, and other cities also have revealed the fact that organized playgrounds and recreation activities under trained leaders provide a wholesome and safe outlet for that abundant energy which, when depressed, frequently finds outlet only in delinquency and wrong doing.

**SAYS MOVIES LESSEN  
ORIENTALS' RESPECT**

**Lawlessness Portrayed Degrading to Westerners In the Eyes of East**

"Do the movies lessen the oriental's respect for the white man in the east?" This was the subject of a talk given in Fullerton hall, Art Institute, last week, by Professor Quincy Wright, of the University of Chicago. Mr. Wright decided the question in the affirmative because of the tendency of the films to show lawlessness, disrespect for authority and the unrestrained passions of the white race. It is probably true that the motion picture will not become of much benefit to the race until it eliminates the cheap sensationalism of the gun-play drama, the lurid sex triangle, the crook-hero story and the high-life society plot where drinking and carousing are boldly flaunted. There are a few producers who have given the public films of which they may well be proud. "America," produced by Griffith was a film in which much attention was given to the artistic setting and the scenes as they were unfolded on the screen presented a series of artistic panoramas as historically accurate as it was possible to make them, and yet containing a great many scenes upon which any landscape artist would stamp his unqualified approval.

**STATE UNIVERSITY  
ENROLLMENT GROWS**

Showing an increased registration in every department the total enrollment of the University of Illinois for 1925-26 is 13,399, according to an announcement made today. This is an increase of 1307 over last year. The number includes only bona fide resident students attending the Urbana and Chicago departments of the university.

Of the number, 12,263 are enrolled in Urbana, while 1,136 attended the Medicine, Dentistry and Pharmacy division at Chicago.

Men outnumbered the women two and one half times, the figures indicated, 9,522 men having attended the institution as against 3,877 women.

One of the outstanding features of enrollment is the fact that for the first time in years the College of Agriculture shows an increase rather than a decrease over the preceding year. While the increase in this instance is only one, agricultural authorities seem to believe that it is the turning point.
