STATE UNIVERSITY TRACK MEET IN MAY
Thirty-First Annual Affair Is Open to Winners in District Meets

The famous University of Illinois interscholastic track meet will be run off on May 14 and 15 this year under a new plan, which is expected greatly to increase the class and interest of the competition.

For 31 years the meet has been open to all representatives of public high schools in the state. This year the contestants will be chosen by their showings in fifteen district meets held on May 8 in various parts of the state, the locations to be made by the officers of the state high school athletic association who will meet in Chicago next Saturday to make the final plans in conjunction with representatives of the university.

Members of the winning team in each district and also the young athletes of other schools who win first or second place in each event in the district meets will be automatically eligible for competition in the big meet at the university. Double representation will be allotted to Cook county on account of its size.

While this may cut down the size of the field in the interscholastic, it will surely increase the class of the competition. The new system also will inspire greater interest in track throughout the state high schools. The state golf and tennis tournaments will be conducted as before, with a free-for-all entry list.

Illinois, as usual, will offer an interesting program of athletics at which all contestants will be guests. An invitation also will be extended to all contestants in the district meets who fall to win a chance to compete in the finals.

WHAT TO DO WHEN OUT OF GASOLINE
If Your Supply Runs Out On The Road You Can Always Worry Along

Motorists who run out of gas on the road frequently have trouble in getting gas into the vacuum tank which has run dry. If the driver stalled on the road finds himself without a funnel or is unable to remove the filler plug from the vacuum tank, he need not worry. "It is unnecessary to refill a vacuum tank manually," says a bulletin issued by the mechanical first aid department of the Chicago Motor club. "If the engine is cranked by hand or by means of the starter, suction will act upon the fuel in the main tank and refill the vacuum tank. One precaution is necessary: the throttle should be closed. If this is not done the engine will suck air through the carburetor instead of through the vacuum suction pipe."
