

**HUMAN ELEMENT IN NEWSPAPER NOTED**

**EXPERT DEPICTS FEATURE**

**Harrington Points Out That Despite Speed With Which Work Is Done and Many Participating It Is Very Accurate**

"The Human Newspaper," the topic of the radio talk from the Chicago Daily News station last Wednesday evening by Director H. F. Harrington, head of the Medill School of Journalism of Northwestern university, demonstrated that while newspapers, like persons, are prone to err occasionally, all in all, the great metropolitan daily is interesting and instructive. Professor Harrington told his listeners that when one recalls that newspapers are the product of a few hours and that scores of individuals are responsible for the contents, it is not difficult to understand why an error creeps in.

**To Err Is Human**  
"The lawyer draws up a faulty indictment and the prisoner is acquitted; the doctor makes a wrong diagnosis, and the patient dies; the banker finds blunders in his bookkeeping; the merchant stocks up on goods that do not sell. All of these men keep their blunders to themselves—but when the newspaperman makes a slip a hundred citizens pounce on him," said Director Harrington.

He added that the wonder is that the newspaper, compiled in such a short time, is as accurate as it is. Then he explained some of the great uses of the newspaper in offsetting a few pardonable errors.

"There's no doubt that the newspaper does supply a real need for information these days," continued Mr. Harrington. "I know my wife never buys an article downtown without consulting the advertisements. Every one of us must use the newspaper to keep up with the world. I wonder just what we find in our favorite daily which makes it so readable, sometimes to the exclusion of other forms of literature. Have you ever thought of some of its chief attractions?"

**Illustrates by Examples**  
With the co-operation of Phil Jordan of the Medill school, Director Harrington, in question and answer dialogue, showed what some of these interesting bits are and mentioned various stories of recent date to prove his points. He quoted from a New York newspaper's recent account of two very ancient inmates of the United Home for Aged Hebrews at New Rochelle broaching marriage at an age of over 100, with the man finally put to rest by the appearance of the woman's great grandchildren and by Mrs. Goldberg's own common sense.

**TELLS FUNDAMENTAL HUMAN ACTIVITIES**

**Michael Pupin, Noted Inventor, Says They Are Science, Arts, Religion**

Michael Pupin, inventor of many important telephonic and radio devices, cites the three fundamental human activities in an article "The New Reformation" in the March Scribner's Magazine.

"Science, the fine arts, and religion represent the three fundamental activities of the human soul," he says, "and the highest beauty of Christian life consists in a harmonious blending of these three fundamental activities, just as the beauties of human vision consist in a harmonious blending of its three fundamental colors. Sentiments of this kind must have been at work in those days to produce the revolutionary changes in the mental attitude of the world with regard to the new science which found its highest expression in Newton. These changes manifested themselves in many ways. When Newton died the church buried his earthly remains in Westminster Abbey, and in his epitaph we find the words: 'He was the glory of mankind.' This was the sentiment of the English people and of their churches without regard to sect or creed. Was there a dissenting voice on the part of any people or of any church in any part of the world?"
