The American disarmament commissioners will sail from the United States on or about April 30th, to be present at the conference in Europe. Already there has been noted that there is a disposition to speak of this gathering as a disarmament conference proper. It is just as well before the story runs too far afield that the American people should understand that it is a conference for the purpose of discussing the advisability of holding a disarmament conference. It is wholly possible that after the representatives of the various nations meet that they may decide that this is not the proper time, and that it had better be postponed for a year or so. It is well therefore that the public have a full understanding of the real scope of this meeting so that they do not antic- Rector. ipate accomplishments in actual disarmament when this mission has only power to discuss the advisability of holding such a con-

Mellon Makes it Clear

Secretary Mellon, speaking before the Union League Club of Philadelphia, clarified the entire foreign debt situation with simple phrases which should be understandable by all. As he pointed out, we have become Europe's most important creditors because of the money we have loaned, and which we desire to have returned to us. We want our money. Europe is finding it hard to pay. If we ask too much we may get nothing. We cannot collect more than the debtor is able to pay. Europe also, it is well to remember, is more than a debtor, she is our best customer. She takes annually two and one-half billion dollars worth of our surplus commodities.

"I should rather," he said, "have solvent customers in the future, which permit me to run a profitable business, than insist upon terms of settlement which will again force my customers into bankruptcy. A business man would prefer making \$100 in his business than being repaid \$5 of a debt. The farmer or the laboring man would rather have a market for our surplus in Europe than save a dollar in federal taxes."

Billions For Buildings

The Department of Commerce has estimated that over eight billion dollars will be spent in 1926 in building operations. An interesting feature of this estimate is the number of rural buildings which are planned for erection. While it is true that the total of expenditures for these buildings is quite modest in comparison with expenditures for industrial plants and buildings in the large cities, it is a matter of satisfaction that the expenditures planned for rural structures and homes surpasses all records in the past.

Out of this total expenditure of eight billion, over three billion dollars will be paid directly as wages to the workmen employed out of town. on the same. In addition, we might count in, although no estimate has been made, the workmen in the building-supplies and other lines who also will undoubtedly receive at least another two billion of wages out of the five billion paid for material. With figures like this at hand, the plain, common garden variety of citizen can continue to plan on sending his boys and girls to college, and ignore the fictitious slump of values on Wall street in New York.


