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CAN YOU SIZE UP YOUR NEIGHBOR?

TOPIC DISCUSSED BY PROF.

He Says Bumps on Head, Hand-writing, Facial Form, Etc., Are No Indication; Psychology Helps Some

Bumps, letters of recommendation, hand-writing, facial characteristics, or even an alert and pleasing eye are not to be trusted as judges of character or ability, according to E. L. Clark, assistant personnel director at Northwestern university, in discussing the topic, "Can You Size Up Your Neighbor?"

"To size up persons, all sorts of schemes have been devised," said Mr. Clark. "The ancients, and a few moderns, have believed that the stars control in some mysterious fashion the fate of men and nations. Who is not familiar with the words, which Shakespeare has Cassius say to Brutus: 'The fault, dear Brutus, is not in our stars but in ourselves that we are underlings?'"

Horoscope No Guide "Today no scientist accepts in any literal sense the belief that the stars control our destinies, but how many people read half-seriously the little books describing the character of individuals according to the month of their birth?"

"Much more recently in history, within the last 200 years, systems have been worked out which attempt to read character by certain physical characteristics of the head and face. In such systems, bumps on the head are taken to indicate particular traits. In spite of the lack of evidence to support such systems, our interest in knowing something of the hidden nature of our fellow-men allows certain newspapers still to print photographs of criminals,—photographs labeled in such a way as to show the alleged location of the already-well-known traits of degeneracy. These and other schemes for reading character, such as palmistry, are either entirely fallacious in their assumptions, or, at best, are extremely inadequate."

Intelligence Tests

Dr. Clark here considered actual intelligence tests but reported that if one is to assume that one or more persons can accurately measure an individual's traits or ability, he is mistaken. Often a person has not known another person long and hence is not competent to give an accurate opinion. In other cases, a person may always be prone to estimate other persons too high, or possibly too low.

"Psychological tests are now available which, when properly administered, give more reliable information concerning one's intelligence than could be obtained from the estimate of one's entire circle of friends," declared the speaker.

An Illustration

"As a class-room exercise I once had my students judge the intelligence of eight children by their photographs," continued Dr. Clark. "I asked my students to rank the children in the order of their intelligence, assigning the most intelligent child the first place, the next most intelligent one second place, and so on, giving the least intelligent the eighth place. Each child's intelligence had been previously determined by using rather accurate intelligence tests. Looking over the 25 estimates of my students I found much disagreement among them. Children whom some students ranked first in intelligence, others ranked eighth or seventh or some other low grade. In fact, three photographs received seven of the eight possible ranks and the remaining five photographs received every possible rank. The average rank of each child was nearly the same. This suggested chance and in order to make a test I placed the name of the children on slips of paper and the first drawn out of a hat I assigned to first place and so on. When the results of these drawings were compared with the judgments made by my students it was found that they were in some cases nearer and in others a little farther from the true order as determined by the intelligence tests. When all of the 25 students' judgments were averaged to get a single rating it was found that the average was only a little better than the average of 25 chance drawings."

Mr. Clark stated that the average letter of recommendation was about as good as a throw of dice to estimate character.
