

**URGES EX-SOLDIERS
REVIVE INSURANCE**

JULY 2 LAST DAY OF GRACE

**Cannot Be Renewed Thereafter
Under Present Law; Legion
Post Will Aid Any Service
Men Who Wish Assistance**

The state of Illinois sent 320,000 men into the military service during the World war. Virtually all of these men took out the War Risk Insurance while in the service but since their discharge over three-fourths, not knowing the value of this insurance, allowed it to lapse and today are in ignorance as to their rights to reinstatement and conversion of this insurance.

Much Insurance Lapsed

The insurance dropped amounts to over two and one-half billion dollars. Under the supervision of Dr. Frank T. Duffy, regional manager of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, 111 N. Canal street, Chicago, Illinois, all ex-service men's organizations, the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Home Service Chapters of the American Red Cross, will conduct an intensive campaign during the next three months and endeavor to have all the ex-service men who have allowed their insurance to lapse, to reinstate it.

A great many men when in the service virtually took out the insurance against their own wishes in the matter, but today are realizing that after all the government was right in this matter. The protection was needed at that time and was given at a very low rate. Since their return from the service protection is needed now more than ever and they can still have the advantage of obtaining government insurance at less than cost.

The officers of the American Legion Posts will gladly explain the many benefits of government insurance to the men if given an opportunity. If you haven't reinstated and converted your insurance get in touch with one of these organizations as soon as possible and talk it over with them.

Remember that July 2, 1926 is absolutely the last day, under the present law upon which this insurance can be reinstated and converted to one of the six standard forms of policies that the U. S. government is writing for the ex-service men of the World war only, and remember that this insurance is absolutely the best, safest and cheapest insurance that can possibly be bought.

**FREE SPEECH DOES
NOT MEAN LICENSE**

**No Man Has Right to Advocate
Overthrow of Government,
Says Lockwood**

Free speech means the right to every man to express his opinion as to our government and its constitution and laws, but does not mean the right to advocate the overthrow of the government by violence, according to George B. Lockwood, who writes editorially in the current number of the National Republic under the caption: "What Free Speech Means." Mr. Lockwood says in part:

"But what does 'free speech' mean? Freedom does not mean that each man shall do as he pleases regardless of the welfare or safety or rights of others. It means that he shall be free to do what he pleases, up to the point where he does not invade the freedom of others or the general interests of society. Freedom cannot be the monopoly of any one individual or group. It must be limited by the right of others to similar freedom.

"We have here a government by public opinion. Under our form of government public opinion can change both the constitution and the laws. The means are provided by which this can be accomplished. There can be a complete change in the personnel of government and in the laws which govern the American people within a period of six years; for within that period every executive and legislative officer must return to the people for a grant of authority.

"Free speech means the right of every citizen to express his own views with regard to our officials, our laws, our institutions, and even our government itself, in an effort to change these laws, officials, institutions and form of government. Any limitation of that right would represent a departure from the spirit of Americanism.

"The 'right' to advocate the violent overthrow of our government does not exist, any more than the right of the individual to publicly advocate the lynching of his neighbor and to incite a mob to that end. When that 'right' is demanded in behalf of agitators who publicly acknowledge their loyalty to an alien political party dominating a government which makes no concealment of its purpose to overthrow this government by revolution, it is invoked in behalf of treason, which the constitution defines as giving aid and comfort to this nation's enemies."

**LIVING EXPENSES
IN FARMER BUDGET**

**Should Be Considered In Calculating
Average Income,
Says Report**

The cash income from the farm is not the only item to be taken into account in figuring the farmers income as they get material assistance in the way of food products for the family, houses and in some instances fuel. According to the Department of Agriculture, data collected from several thousand farms shows that the value of the family living at farm prices approximates one-third of the cost of the living of farm families, and two-thirds of the cost of food, fuel and house rent. It averages one-ninth of the farm receipts and one-third of the farm income.

The figures, as the department points out, vary with the different localities and the different years, and with the different families, too. Six and seven years ago, when the farmer was considered very prosperous, the value of the family living on the farm was only about a fifth as much as the farm income. But after deflation and depression came, two or three years later the value of the family living on the farm was one-third of the income.

The department points out further, however, that the value of this living does not come to the farmer freely without effort and free of cost. The direct money cost for some of the items enumerated is not great, but represents labor, capital and sometimes cash outlay for materials.

But much of the capital employed in raising the food items for the family is necessary for farm business and the materials used in their production are sometimes by-products or wastes from the living. Much of the labor in producing the family living is done at odd moments, or by the children.

The value of the house rent on the farm includes interest, depreciation on the house and cash costs of insurance, taxes and repairs.

**MAY CHANGE SIZE
OF PAPER MONEY**

**Various Reasons Suggested for
Plan; Different Sizes for
Different Amounts**

The government, it is reported in press dispatches from Washington, will soon radically change the form of its paper money, which has remained unaltered almost since the foundation of the republic.

Several reasons dictate the change, it is stated. First is that of economy. The paper which is now used, because of a secret process in the possession of the Crane Paper Mills of Dalton, Mass., is only obtainable at a high cost. The process, which was perfected under the direction of former Senator W. Murray Crane, late owner of the mills, is said to weave silk threads in the paper in such a manner as to defy successful imitation.

The new plans are to secure five notes from a sheet instead of four, as at present.

Additional safeguards against counterfeiting constitute another reason for the decision to issue new notes. While it has not been definitely decided, the suggestion is being considered that bills of different denominations be issued in varying sizes.

Such a scheme, it is pointed out, will make it impossible to raise a two-dollar note to a twenty or a two hundred one, as has been successfully accomplished in the past.
