**STATISTICS SHOW UNIVERSITY FACTS GIFTS AND BUDGETS NOTED**

**Surpluses Have Been Shown In Most of Larger Colleges Recently; Figures Are Interesting**

Some interesting comparisons of gifts to the university budget have just been made by George S. Dalgety of the Northwestern university business office, showing that Northwestern, in relations to other universities of its class, lags somewhat. In 1924-25 Northwestern budget gifts were \$187,843.35; the year previous, 1923-24 Yale's gifts totaled \$581,679.05; \$1,782,959.37; Yale's were a bit low at \$1,204,607.97; Columbia's were rather high at \$2,902,759.44.

In the far west, Leland Stanford educational fees in 1923-24 amounted to \$688,856.19, while Princeton in the far east had fees reaching \$1,016,895. Smaller colleges and universities reported fewer gifts and smaller educational fees. This was to be expected. In the same report, the highest salaries paid the college professor, Northwestern's report hardly compared favorably with various universities in its class. The maximum salary for a full professorship at Northwestern was reported at \$6,800; at Stanford it was \$7,500; at Harvard, \$10,000; at Columbia, \$10,000; at Yale, \$10,000; at Princeton, \$7,500; at Chicago, it was \$10,000, and at Brown, a smaller university than Northwestern, the maximum was \$6,000.

**Salaries and Budget**

Perhaps one of the most significant factors in Mr. Dalgety's album is that which discloses the comparison between salaries for instruction and the total budget receipts. The following percentages will prove of interest to persons who do not know the cost of instruction in modern institutions of learning.

Northwestern university, 49.25 per cent; Chicago 48.5 per cent; Oberlin, 50.95 per cent; Stanford, 53.75 per cent. Sister universities range about the same. Whereas Northwestern's maximum salary figure is less for a professor than at some other schools, its total salary list, because of the number of its faculties mounts up very high. At nearly all of the better-known universities, however, annual surpluses have been shown recently and, while at Northwestern there has been no recorded deficit, the last year or two reserves had to be used to even up the balance.

**AMERICANS HEAVY MEAT CONSUMERS**

Nearly 109 million head of live stock went to appune Uncle Sam's appetite for meat during 1925, according to a statement issued by the National Live Stock and Meat Board. This figure was divided as follows: cattle, 14,705,986; calves, 10,099,195; sheep and lambs, 15,453,853; hogs, 68,294,297.

The average person ate nearly one-half pound of meat per day the figures showed. There was an increase in the use of beef, veal and lamb and mutton, but pork showed a decline due, it was believed, to the prevailing shortage of hogs. More veal was consumed than ever before in the history of the country.

**CLYMER, SIGNER OF DECLARATION OF REVOLUTIONARY FAME**

**Member of Continental Congress and Combated Notion That Representatives Always Vote As Directed**

A true leader of Revolutionary days was of service to his country insofar as he possessed many and diverse talents and made use of them all. Such a man was George Clymer, one of the Pennsylvania signers of the Declaration of Independence, which will be celebrated in Philadelphia, by the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, extending from June 1 to December 1.

Aside from many offices and committee appointments which he was called upon to fill as a statesman, George Clymer is known as a founder of the Pennsylvania Agricultural society, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the Pennsylvania bank.

**Member Continental Congress**

He was a member of the Continental congress in 1776, 1777 and in 1780. With Richard Stockton, he was appointed to inspect the Northern Army at Ticoderooga on September 26, 1776. In December of the same year, when the approach of the British forced congress to flee to Baltimore, the Pennsylvania signer was one of the commissioners left in Philadelphia, to attend to the public interests.

Tact, decision and honesty are some of the qualities which characterized his dealings, particularly those with the Indians.

When he was appointed a commissioner to treat with the Indians at Fort Pitt, it was largely upon his report to congress that the government was induced to carry the war into the enemy's country.

It was natural that Clymer should become a member of the convention which framed the national constitution and a representative in the first congress to function under it. His "platform" constitutes a quaint commentary upon the politics, immigration and debt funding of the period.

Opposed bestowal of titles upon the president and vice president.

**Combated This Notion**

Combated notion that representatives should always vote in accordance with constituents' instructions. Favored gradual naturalization of foreigners.

Supported the assumption of state debts by the nation.

After concluding a treaty with the Creek and Cherokee Indians, George Clymer withdrew from public life. He died in 1813 at the age of seventy-four.

**RE-ENACT FLIGHT FROM VALLEY FORGE**

**Washington's Evacuation To Be Subject of Great Pageant at Big Exhibit**

The evacuation by Washington and his Continental army will be reenacted upon the fields of Valley Forge, June 15th, as part of the pageantry surrounding the Flag Day exercises of the Sesqui-Centennial Exhibition association and the city of Philadelphia. Nearly 5,000 persons will take part in the event assisted by visiting military commands from the thirteen original states whose beginnings date back to the revolution.

The pageant will last the greater part of the day. A mounted courier will gallop over the hills at 2:00 p. m. announcing to Washington's army the evacuation of Philadelphia by Clinton and the British, following which a bugle call will assemble the Continental troops. After maneuvers on the old Valley Forge encampment grounds the troops will march off as crowds of persons in the civilian costume of the time speed them on their way as they did on June 19, 1778, the day of evacuation. The exercises will terminate with a dress parade and review of the visiting military commands.

All the participants will be costumed in the uniforms of the time and the spectacle is expected to rival anything of its kind ever produced for impressiveness and historical interest. The governors of the thirteen original states and General Pershing have been invited and are expected to attend.

**OPEN HEADQUARTERS FOR SESQUI, CHICAGO**

Headquarters for the transaction of business relating to the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, to be held in Philadelphia June 1 to December 1, in western territory, have been opened in Chicago. Increased demands for information and for exhibit space have necessitated the branch office where all western contracts will be handled.

The unqualified support of Chicago has been promised the new Sesqui headquarters by Mayor Dever with whom Mayor W. Freeland Kendrick of Philadelphia, president of the Exposition association, has been in communication.

F. B. Mulford, formerly of the Philadelphia office, has been placed in charge of the Chicago headquarters.

**OPENING OF SKOKIE BRANCH IS DEFERRED**

Opening of the new Skokie Valley line of the Chicago North Shore & Milwaukee railroad set for last week has been deferred for several weeks it was stated this morning. Storms and other brands of uncomfortable weather during the past three weeks has retarded work on construction on the new line and officials of the company were unprepared to state today as to when the new line would be ready for operation.

The date of opening of the new line was originally set for May 1 but as the construction was moving along at a rapid pace about a month ago and indications were that the work would be completed much earlier than anticipated and it was announced that the trains would in all probability be started over the line last week.

It is understood however that the tracks, overhead system and in fact all of the equipment of the railroad is in place with the exception of some parts of the electrical power system, which is now being installed.

That no definite date as to the opening of the new line had been set was stated at the office of the North Shore line but a few days ago, but it was declared that it would be placed into operation within several weeks.

**MINIATURE AIRCRAFT TOURNEY FOR BOYS**

Boy and girl readers of this paper are invited to enter the fourth annual tournament for miniature aircraft fliers to be held at the Chicago Municipal Pier auditorium on May 8, according to Walter Wright, secretary of the bureau of parks and playgrounds.

"This little organization has spread not only to other cities of this nation, but to those of other nations," he said. "When we remember that Art Smith of the air mail and E. P. Lett of the National Air Transport, Inc., got their start in aviation through rubber-motored aircraft over 10 years ago, we know that these M. A. F. tournaments are more than mere child's play."

"The first tournament, in 1923, had 75 contestants. In 1924 there were 150 fliers with 225 aircraft. And last year (1925) there were approximately 350 fliers with nearly 500 aircraft at the pier."
