Green Bay Petition
At this point the council took a recess and met as the board of local improvements. The board received a petition from property owners on North Green Bay road requesting that Green Bay road from Central avenue to the north limits of the city be widened to 24 feet and resurfaced with asphalt. The petition was placed on file.

The engineers were instructed to prepare plans and estimate for paving an alley in Block 5, in accordance with petition presented. The ordinance for paving and water mains, hereinafter described, were recommended to the council.

Water Main Ordinances
When the council reconvened the board submitted the following ordinances:

Ordinance providing for construction of connected system of water mains in Winthrop road, Devonshire road, Devonshire road.

Ordinance providing for construction of connected system of water mains in Sherwood avenue, Harlan court, Deerfield avenue, Blodgett place, West Parkway, East Parkway, Western avenue, Taylor avenue, Sandwick court, South End court, North End court, Beverly place, Athletic Field lane and West Park avenue.

Ordinance providing for construction of connected system of water mains in Hiawatha Trail, Hiawatha court, Ny-o-da place, Winona road.

Ordinance providing for construction of connected system of water mains in Eastview road, Sumac road, Ridgeway road, Old Briar road, Balsam road, Blossom court and Poplar road.

Ordinance providing for construction of connected system of water mains in Deerfield avenue, Ridgeland avenue, Ellendale road, Northland avenue, Garland avenue, Midland avenue, Ridgeway avenue, McCraren road, Arbor avenue, Fernside avenue, Edgewood avenue, Glenwood avenue, Eastwood avenue, Cloverdale avenue, Sunnyside avenue and Ridge road.

Motion was made and carried in each instance placing these ordinances on file for public inspection in the city clerk's office until time for their final passage.

Paving Ordinance

Another ordinance submitted by the board was for construction of a reinforced concrete pavement in Lincolnwood road, St. Johns avenue, Marion court, Pierce road, Braeside road, Lakeside place, Brownville road, Ravine Manor road, Carol court, Delta road, Dell lane and Pleasant court. On motion of Commissioner Courley this ordinance was referred to committee of the whole and the council then resolved itself into a committee of the whole and after consideration of the project reconvened as the council to pass on the plan, whereupon the report of the committee of the whole was presented, recommending passage of the ordinance. This was done, and the ordinance placed on file in the clerk's office for public inspection until final passage.

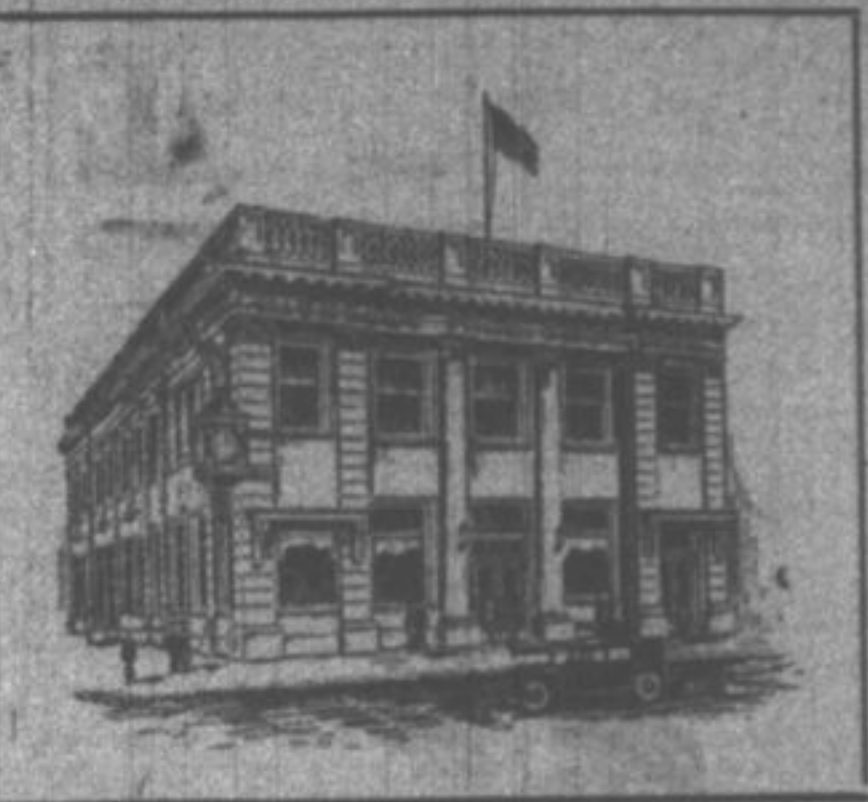
REPAIRING STREETS FAST AS POSSIBLE
