

FREIGHT WRECK AT DEERFIELD FRIDAY

Gondola Leaps From Track and Derails Several Cars; No Casualties

When the trucks on a gondola became defective Friday on the Deerfield crossing, the car was thrown from its line of cars into a passing freight wrecking six cars and halting traffic about three-quarters of an hour.

The police who were called to the wreck, reported that no one was injured because the cars, in each line, happened to be in the middle of the freight.

One train was almost one mile long, police said, extending for about one-half a mile each side of the crossing. The gondola with the defective trucks shot from its track and across the clearing into the middle of the other line of cars. Wreckers soon cleared the tracks.

HUDSON-ESSEX CARS MAKE MARCH RECORD

In March more than 31,000 cars were manufactured and shipped by the Hudson-Essex Co., an increase of more than 75 per cent over the March of a year ago, which was itself an unusually good month. According to the best information available, this 31,000 cars was the largest number of six cylinder cars ever made and shipped in the history of the industry. Despite unseasonable weather all over the country, more than 90 per cent of these cars were sold at retail—another record-making achievement.

Of course, not all such calls were to the large cities, but there were more for Chicago than for any other point. Next came New York. Following New York came Philadelphia, Boston, Kansas City, Detroit, Dallas, Minneapolis and Pittsburg.

These calls traveled east from Los Angeles to Yuma, Maricopa and Tucson, then on to El Paso and up to Denver and thence to Chicago and other points.

FOUNDER OF SCOUTING IN CHICAGO MAY 7-8

Sir Robert Powell Guest of Honor at Dinner May 7; N. S. Council Representatives

The founder of scouting, Sir Robert S. S. Baden Powell, who is the chief scout of the world, will be in Chicago on May 7 and 8.

Friday evening, May 7, a dinner will be given in honor of Sir Robert at the Hotel Sherman by the scout leaders of this region. The North Shore Council is very fortunate in being able to send ten scoutmasters and deputy scout commissioners to this dinner.

Saturday afternoon, May 8, a monster scout rally in honor of Sir Robert will be held at the Dexter Pavilion in Chicago. Each council in the region has been allotted a delegation to the rally in proportion to its scout membership. The North Shore Council will be represented by fifty picked, uniformed scouts, who will be in charge of four scoutmasters and the scout executive.

The scouts will leave Highland Park in a body in time to reach the Dexter Pavilion by two-thirty p. m.

Sir Robert is a world known figure in scouting, he founded scouting in England and assisted in the formation of the Boy Scouts of America in 1910.

Due to the fact that there are over 75,000 Boy Scouts in region seven, regional headquarters had to set a limit to the delegations from each council. The scouts from the North Shore Council who are to attend will be picked by the scoutmasters of their various troops on the basis of their scouting efficiency, neatness, and bearing as scouts. So it will be a real honor for the scouts who are picked to attend.

Previous to leaving Highland Park the scouts will be inspected to insure correct uniform and equipment.

It has been planned that Sir Robert will present Eagle Scout badges to the scouts who have won them since March 1. Scout Henry Bacon of the Sea Scout Ship "Port Clinton," of Highland Park will be presented with the Eagle badge at this time.

The rank of Eagle Scout is the highest award possible for a scout to obtain, it is the goal of every true scout from the time he enrolls until he has won the coveted silver Eagle badge.

Since 1921 the following scouts in Highland Park have attained the coveted Eagle rank, the first four scouts listed are still active in scouting in Highland Park: Lyman McBride, Albert Snite, Page Beers, Henry Bacon, Fritz Boynton, Charles Drake, Edmund Gifford, John Gifford, Wilfred Nichols, and Dan Rogers.

Mr. H. Ame Babcock, the scout commissioner of the North Shore Council is the only scout leader in this council who holds the Eagle rank.

TITO SCHIPA OPENS MUSIC CLUB SEASON

World Famous Tenor to Be First Artist in 1926-27 Winnetka Program

Tito Schipa, the celebrated tenor, who opens next year's series of Winnetka Music Club Artist-Recitals, was born at Lecca, Italy. Schipa's parents thought him destined for the priesthood. But at an early age he broke away from his religious studies and entered the conservatory at Lecca for piano study. He then became an accomplished musician and composer before his voice matured, after which he took up singing in the same institution. He made his debut in "La Traviata" in southern Italy. He won such reputation in the smaller cities that he was called to Milan, where he again made his debut in the same opera and also sang in "La Sonnambula" with Mme. Galli-Curci.

Schipa has a tremendous operatic repertoire which alone would have made a career great enough for almost any tenor. But he was not satisfied. That difficult branch, concert singing, appealed to him irresistibly. It is perhaps, the hardest branch of all. Alone on the stage the artist must make each song a picture without the aid of brilliant costumes, scenery, orchestra, or action. Yet in that field Schipa has also secured phenomenal triumph. This is his fourth season in concert work, in which field he is possibly even more popular than in opera.
