SPECIAL ELECTION, TUESDAY, MAY 18, 1926

Description of territory proposed to be annexed and described in the petition signed by a majority of the legal voters and by a majority of the property owners in said territory petitioning the Council of the City of Highland Park to submit to a vote of the people of said City, the question of the annexation of said proposed territory to the City of Highland Park.

The South half of Section 9, Southeast Quarter of Section 8, Northeast Quarter and East half of Southeast Quarter of Section 17 and all of Sections 16 and 21, all of which is in Township 43 North, Range 12 East of the Third Principal Meridian.

Bounded as follows: Beginning at the East Quarter corner of Section 9, Township 43 North, Range 12 East of Third Principal Meridian (said point being the present Northwest corner of the aforesaid City of Highland Park); thence West on the East and West Quarter line of aforesaid Section 9 and on the East and West Quarter line of Section 8, Township and Range aforesaid, to the center of aforesaid Section 8; thence South on the North and South Quarter line of aforesaid Section 8 and on the North and South Quarter line of Section 17, Township and Range aforesaid, to the center of Section 17; thence East on the East and West Quarter line of aforesaid Section 17 to the Northeast corner of the Northwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of aforesaid Section 17; thence South on the Quarter line of the Southeast Quarter of aforesaid Section 17 to the Southeast corner of the Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of the aforesaid Section 17; thence East on the South line of aforesaid Section 17 to the corner of Sections 17-16-21-20, Township and Range aforesaid; thence south on the west line of Section 21, Township and Range aforesaid, to the Southwest corner of aforesaid Section 21; thence East on the South line of Section 21, aforesaid, to the Southeast corner of said Section 21, thence north on the East line of Sections 21, 16 and 9, Township and range aforesaid, to the place of beginning; all in Lake County, Illinois.

##### School Paper

All the steps in the publication of a paper, including copy from students, edited copy, galley of type, galley proofs, with marked corrections, makeup forms, stone proofs, and the printed paper will be on exhibit as Mr. Peers' contribution.

##### Shops In Operation

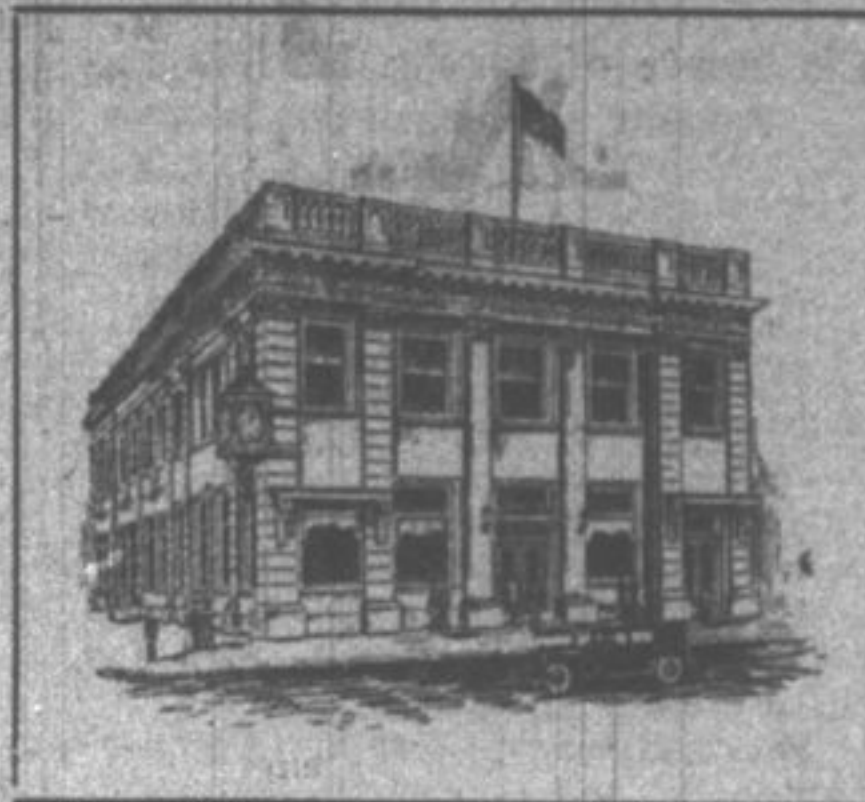
