

**H. S. TEAMS PLACE HIGH IN CONTEST**

**Deerfield Shorthand and Book-keeping Students Winners of Prizes**

A first and two seconds were won by the Deerfield teams entered in the commercial department district contest held at the school Saturday. A first, a second, and a fourth were won by individual competitors.

With a score of 91.5, the Deerfield 90 word a minute shorthand team composed of Margaret Spellman, Beryl Holland, Elna Benson, Dora Phillips, and Ruth Patterson (alternate) won first place. Second, third, and fourth places went to Maine, Riverside, and Hinsdale.

Beryl Holland, with just one point behind the winner, Marie Martin of Hinsdale, came in second in the individual contest.

Second place with a score of 92.55 in the 80 word a minute shorthand contest was captured by a Deerfield team composed of Kathleen Cole, Myrtle Hasse, Anna Johnson, Frances Smigowski, and Elise Oberrach (alternate).

Kathleen Cole won fourth place in the individual contest with a score of 94.66.

In the bookkeeping contest, a new feature of the annual contest, Deerfield's team, composed of Mary Smigowski, Dorothea Braune, Pearl Juhrend, and Walter Siegel (alternate) won second place. Their score was 63.44; that of Maine, the winner, 66.57.

With a score of five points higher than the average of the winning team, Mary Smigowski took first place in the individual entries. Her score was 71.66.

**Deerfield Whitewashes University High in Opening Clash of League Season**
