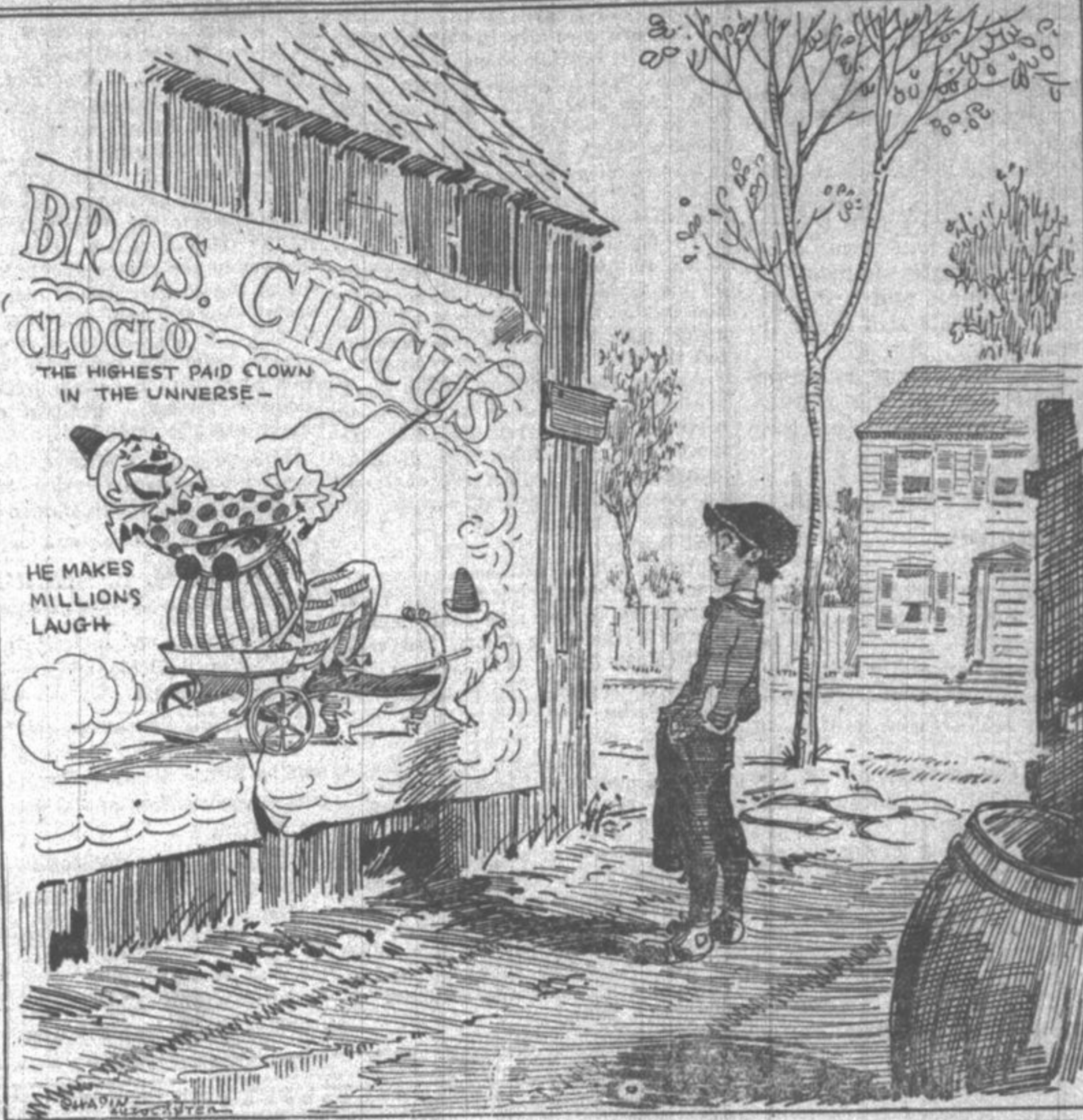
Mr. and Mrs. Eisen, who lived in the rear flat of the Knaak apartment building on Deerfield avenue, moved to Michigan, Monday.

BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

John W. Townsend, aged about 80, a resident of Waukegan for many years, and a pensioner of the American Steel and Wire company died recently at St. Petersburg.

Protesting that farmers with untested herds who had lost their Chicago market, were selling milk in Waukegan, several farmers residing near Waukegan last week asked that the city council take action to halt this practice.

The former Busse estate, former summer home of the late Mayor Fred Busse of Chicago and one of the show places of Fox Lake, has been sold for an undisclosed consideration and will be subdivided into summer home sites.

Looking into the future the Waukegan city council last week named a committee to make a survey of downtown streets with the object in view of widening them to meet traffic needs of the future.

A spectacular fire of unknown origin last week did damage estimated at about \$100,000 to the main building of the Johns-Manville company plant at Asbestos station on the Northwestern line north of Waukegan.

Mrs. Myron F. Moore, 86 years old and for 76 years a resident of this county died last week at her residence at Halfday after a short illness.

The board of supervisors last week voted to reappoint Dr. Charles Leiber, as county physician, for the ensuing year. The petition of Dr. Leiber for reappointment was the only one presented in the meeting and his re-election to the post was practically unanimous.

According to word from California Oliver Thompson, former Waukegan superintendent of schools, suffered a great loss recently, when his home in Compton, Calif., burned to the ground and destroyed practically everything of value excepting what the family had with them at their camp in the mountains.
