And they are not very trustful of children until they learn whether or not the children are their friends.

Children should be taught not to molest nor frighten these feathered friends, and they also should be shown that a good, active family of birds will consume an enormous quantity of harmful bugs during one season. Placing of bird houses at advantageous points about the premises, being sure to offer the proper types and sizes of home for the kind of birds which frequent the neighborhood, helps to induce the songsters to settle. This is all very much worth while, and aside from the benefits conferred by the birds in their war on insects, their presence is an increasing delight as they greet each new day with their marvellous songs.

"Adam and Fallen Man" was the subject of the lesson sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, May 9. The Golden Text was from Ephesians 6:11. "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil."

Among the citations which comprised the sermon was the following pertinent selection from the Bible: "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ. And ye are complete in Him, which is the head of all principality and power" (Col. 2:8, 10).

Also a corresponding passage from the Christian Science text book, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "In divine Science, man is the true image of God. The divine nature was best expressed in Christ Jesus, who threw upon mortals the truer reflection of God and lifted their lives higher than their poor thought-models would allow.—thoughts which presented man as fallen, sick, sinning, and dying. The Christlike understanding of scientific being and divine healing includes a perfect Principle and idea,—perfect God and perfect man,—as the basis of thought and demonstration" (p. 259).
