"One thing less desirable than a clumsy man is a clumsy woman," Mr. Kendig, athletic coach of the Deerfield-Shields high school told the Parent-Teacher association last Thursday afternoon in his talk on "Corrective Exercises," with demonstration by a pupil. Dancing gives the grace necessary. Considering the human body as a machine, dietetics go hand and hand with physical training. Courage also comes from participation in competitive sports. Observance of National Health week promoted the program which was opened by Miss Hendricks, the school nurse, with an account of her work as home visitor, following the physical examination by the school physician, in order to remedy serious defects. Boys to the number of 56, and 53 girls in the school have not been vaccinated. This number will be reduced next year. Miss Byrn told of her work with individual gymnastics, corrective exercises, the work suited to the individual. The Gibson girl with her straight back, an ideal of the "nineties," and the present day slouch were described as the popular ideal of what is done by girls. Miss Byrn tries to make her students realize the attractiveness and additional value of standing correctly, instead of imitating the collapsed posture of wet spaghetti. Sagging beds, high pillows, stooping when reading and eating, are the causes of poor posture.

Discussion following the talks revealed the fact that heart disease is on the increase, and that no child with heart lesion should be in any competitive work. More thorough examinations of pupils will take place next fall.

In the business meeting which preceded the health program Mrs. O. E. Keller presented the new corporation, the Central Parent-Teacher association, for the approval of the D. S. H. S. P. T. A. This body, composed of the president and secretary of each P. T. A. in Highland Park, is for the purpose of making arrangements for the housing of teachers, making leases, floating bonds if necessary, and co-operating with the school board in any question of community interest. Mrs. J. A. Reichelt, Jr., gave a report of the parent-teacher section of the Lake Shore division of the Illinois State Teachers' association in Oak Park, April 19, and of the 27th annual conference of the Illinois Council of Parent-Teacher associations held in Champaign, April 27 to 29, to which she was a delegate, where 1,700 were in attendance.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: president, Mrs. Moses Eisenstaedt; vice president, Mrs. Thomas R. Wyles; secretary, Mrs. Orrin E. Keller; treasurer, Mrs. C. T. Gunn.

In her farewell speech in relinquishing the presidency, Mrs. Raymond W. Flinn expressed her pleasure in having Mrs. Eisenstaedt as her successor, and her gratitude to the school board, the faculty and the members of the P. T. A. for their quick response to all requests. Mrs. Gehr led the vote of appreciation to Mrs. Flinn for her excellent work as president. The social hour was in charge of the members from the Elm Place school district, assisted by those from Oak Terrace.

At the meeting of the executive board, before the regular session of the P. T. A., Miss McMartin quoted Mr. Sandwick in saying that in his twenty-three years of teaching he had never had a happier year than this one, because of the wonderful co-operation of the Parent-Teacher association.

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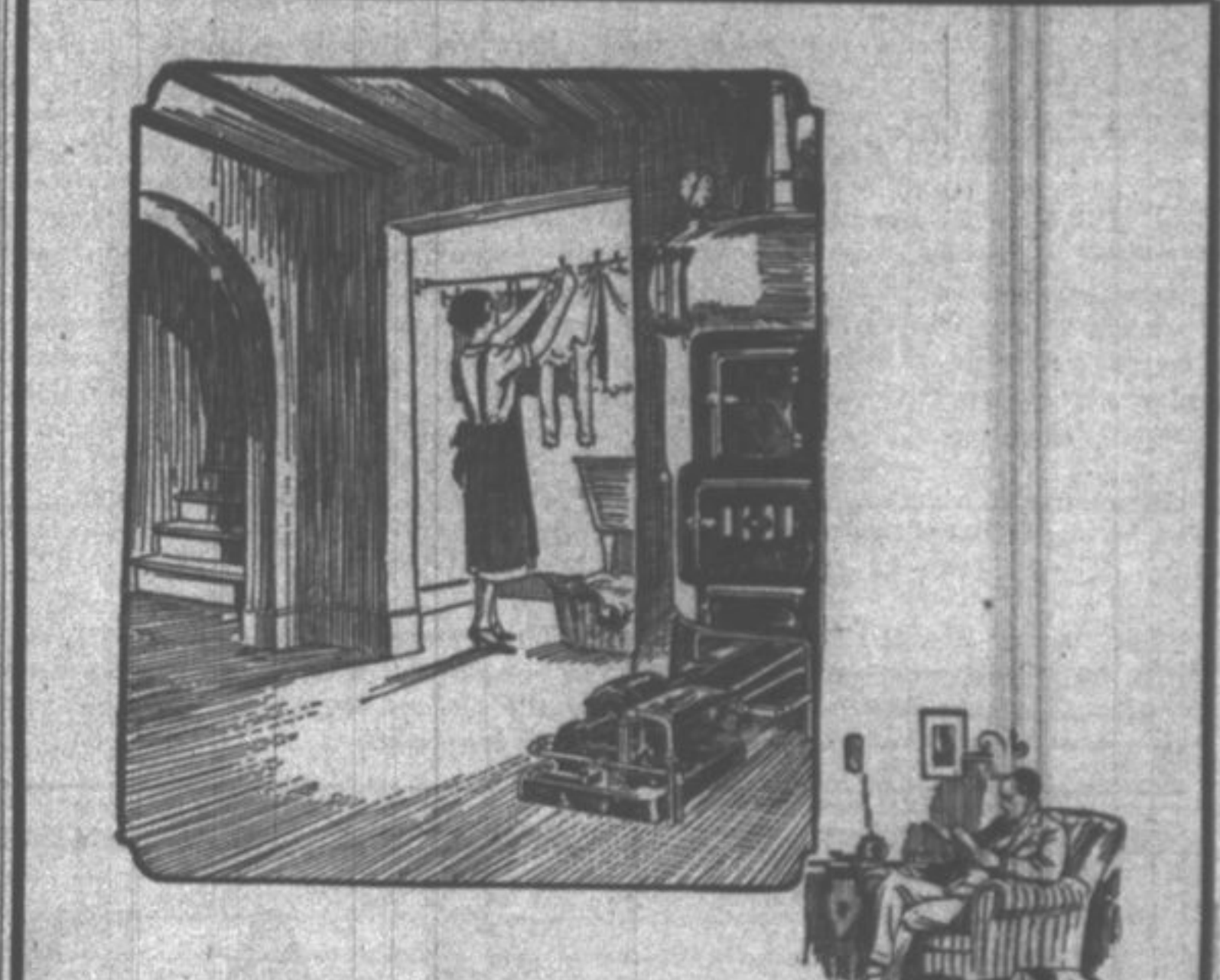
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
