MEMORIAL DAY WILL BE OBSERVED MAY 31

May 30 Is Sunday and Proclamation Fixes Following Day For Ceremonies

SCHOOL CATECHISM GIVES INFORMATION

Booklet Issued by State Teachers Assn. Contains Matter Public Should Know

There has been issued recently by the Illinois State Teachers' association a "Public School Catechism for the State of Illinois, containing in question and answer form much valuable information about the schools of our state."

Here is the first group: 1. What are public schools? Schools maintained under public control and supported by public taxation to offer to every child of school age.

The constitution of Illinois states in Section 1 of Article VIII: "The General Assembly shall provide a thorough and efficient system of free schools whereby all children of this state may receive a good common school education."

Created by constitutional provisions, governed under uniform state laws, and supported by public funds levied under state laws, the school system is essentially a state system.

It must be essentially a state system in order to provide for every boy and girl an education so that the people of the state may govern themselves successfully and preserve their freedom.

2. Do other states pay part of the cost of their schools?

Yes, every state pays some part of school costs. Thirty-three states pay from state funds a larger share than does Illinois; nineteen states pay more than twice the percentage of school costs that our state government bears.

3. Why do states pay part of the cost of schools?

Because education of all the people benefits all the state. Without considerable state aid in equalizing the abilities of the richer and poorer sections, many districts are unable to provide good schools, and thousands of children are denied the boasted American chance—a good education.

4. Why are school opportunities without state aid not equal in various districts?

The assessed valuation per pupil of school age is six times as great in one of the counties as it is in another; among cities the difference in assessed valuation is far greater. The assessed valuation per teacher is over two hundred times as great in one rural school as it is in another.

Therefore, to avoid gross inequalities in educational opportunities and in tax burdens placed upon local districts, the state needs to assume its due responsibility in school support rather than shift such responsibility upon the local districts.

5. What part of the cost of the common schools does the state pay?

The state school fund has formed the following percentages of total school expenditures for the grades and high school:

6. Does the county help contribute to school support?

The county can hardly be regarded as a contributor to educational support in Illinois. In 24 states the counties contribute a larger share of the school revenue than both county and state combined in Illinois.

The voter of the backward section of the county is a voter of the county as well as of the state. It is the duty of the county to be interested in the educational support of all of its schools: "for the good of all, all the schools should be good."

7. With the county as a real factor in school support, educational opportunities as well as the unequal tax burdens borne by wealth would be somewhat equalized.

8. How many pupils are in the Illinois public common schools?

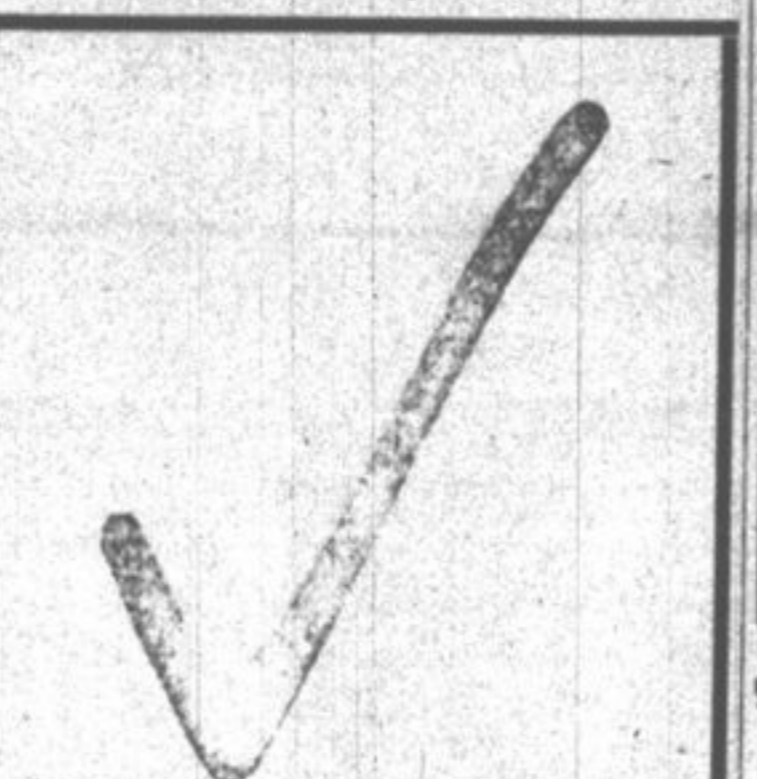
NEW RAILROAD PROJECT GIVEN INCORPORATION

A dispatch from Springfield, dated May 17, says that Secretary of State Louis L. Emerson has issued articles of incorporation to the Chicago Tube Transit Railway Co., of Chicago. The capitalization is \$250,000. The purpose is to construct a railroad from Chicago to Waukegan in Lake County and to Wheeling in Cook County, and to Wheaton and Joliet in Chicago. The incorporators are W. J. Newman, T. W. Gayer, J. P. Carroll, and William O'Brien, all of Chicago, and Timothy Carroll of River Forest.
