Department of public health and safety—Sidney D. Morris, building inspector; Gus Krueger, chief engineer at waterworks; Art Gruel, first assistant engineer; William McClory, second assistant; Ben Botker, third assistant; Edward Hoskin, chief fire marshal; William Cummings, first assistant fire marshal; William Hennis, second assistant marshal; Sid Jennings, fireman No. 1; A. A. Proctor, fireman No. 2; Ray Mann, fireman No. 3; Fred Botker, superintendent of sewers and water mains; Walter Clark, helper in water department; August Scheskie, in charge of incinerator.

Department of streets and public improvements—John Hart, foreman. Commissioner Preston moved that permit granting the E. A. Meyer Construction Co. right to use the incinerator property as a camp site be revoked and that they be given notice to vacate within 30 days.

Commissioner Cheney moved passage of an ordinance providing for construction of a connected system of water mains in Valley road, including all labor, materials, etc., by special assessment, the ordinance to remain on file for public inspection.

Pass Annexation Ordinance. Commissioner Card moved passage of an ordinance annexing the territory upon which the voters of the city expressed approval at the special election, May 18.

Commissioner Cheney moved to pass ordinance fixing salaries of city officers and certain employees of the city, with increases reported in several instances, the ordinance to remain on file for public inspection.

Commissioner Card moved that the Chicago & Northwestern railroad be granted permit to improve its freight yards as outlined in a communication to the mayor and commissioners, subject to approval and under direction of Windes & Marsh, engineers. The improvement is to consist of paving the team track.

Two Appointments. Mayor Hastings appointed George E. Bliss a member of the commission on consolidation of schools, with the recommendation that George R. Jones be retained on the committee. The mayor also appointed Raymond E. Flynn a member of the Appeal board for a term of five years.

Further consideration of John J. Rosen's request for permit to construct water mains by private contract in the Military Academy subdi-

vision was deferred until next meeting.

Commissioner Cheney moved tentative approval of plat of Hield's addition to Braeside subdivision, subject dedication of lots 32 and 71 in said subdivision for street purposes. Commissioner Preston moved tentative approval of a plat of proposed subdivision of Briar Gate Villas.

Commissioner Preston moved that the general plan submitted by Windes & Marsh, engineers, for construction of the west side sanitary sewer system be approved.

Submit Ordinances

The board of local improvements submitted an ordinance providing for construction of water mains in Forest avenue, Golf View avenue, Melvin drive, Northmoor drive, Linden avenue, ordinance, on motion, was placed on file for public inspection.

The board also submitted an ordinance for construction of connected system of water mains in Grove avenue, and on motion this ordinance also was placed on file for public inspection.

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rate of interest and at once remedy the water supply shortage.

The second proposition is for the issuance of \$10,000.00 Funding Bonds. These bonds are to provide for the payment of obligations incurred by the Village from three to ten years ago and none of which have been incurred recently. In order to maintain the credit of the Village these obligations must be paid and the only available method is by the issuance of general obligation bonds. These bonds are to be issued to pay public benefits on the original water system and for expenses incurred in preparation of the plans and assessment for the sewer system proposed in 1922 but which were abandoned as being inadequate for the growing needs of Deerfield. Legal judgments are now outstanding against the Village for these debts and they must be paid. An increase in general

taxes of approximately only 3% over a ten year period will be sufficient to retire these bonds and the Village will save many times the amount so expended by maintaining its credit.

Both of these issues will sell for 100%. If these two issues are allowed all special assessment bonds on new improvements will correspondingly increase in market value because the credit of the village shall have been established at 100%.
