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LIVING ROOM IS GROWING LARGER

TENDENCY MODERN HOME Bedroom and Kitchen Smaller, Says Expert in Address On Arrangement of Interiors

Year by year the American living room is growing larger and larger, until eventually it bids fair to approach the dimensions of a baronial hall. Such was the message Dudley Crafts Watson delivered on the topic of "The Living Room," which he gave to a full house in Fullerton hall, Art Institute, recently. And that's the way it should be, said the speaker. He would rather have one large living room in his home and a few other rooms small, than a large number of rooms all cut up into little cubby holes.

Bedrooms Smaller
Bedrooms are growing smaller and smaller, but closets are a necessity and it is well to have a closet each for father and mother, for it will save a lot of trouble. And the American kitchen is growing smaller and smaller and that also is as it should be, for the present day housewife has to

spend only about one-sixteenth part of her time in the kitchen that her grandmother spent there. The drawing-room has disappeared altogether and with the old fashioned sitting-room has been merged into the present day living room, which is quite proper, for the drawing-room was only an artificial makeshift at the best.

The front hall should be a thing of cheerfulness, preferably with a red tile floor. But by all means, said the speaker, do not have a mirror in the hall facing a guest as he enters. Mirrors are all right, but they should be placed so that the guest may look into them as he leaves. Do not hang pictures of landscapes in the hall, for the guest has just come in from a landscape and naturally does not want to see another. But hang a picture of flowers or still-life or tapestry—something colorful and cheerful.

The old fashioned hall-tree has gone the way of discarded relics of the past. In its place should be a chest about as high as a chair into which rubbers and umbrellas may be placed on shelves within the chest. Wraps may be placed on top or on chairs, or in the guest rooms.

A fireplace, to get the best results, should be in a corner of the room

whence the heat may radiate to all parts. The Russians always place their fireplaces in this way and you will find that the American Hopi Indians do the same. Do not have your large pieces of furniture set against the walls, but arrange them so that the living room may be broken up into several units, with an easy chair and a lamp for each member of the family. You will find, then, that they will always stay at home.

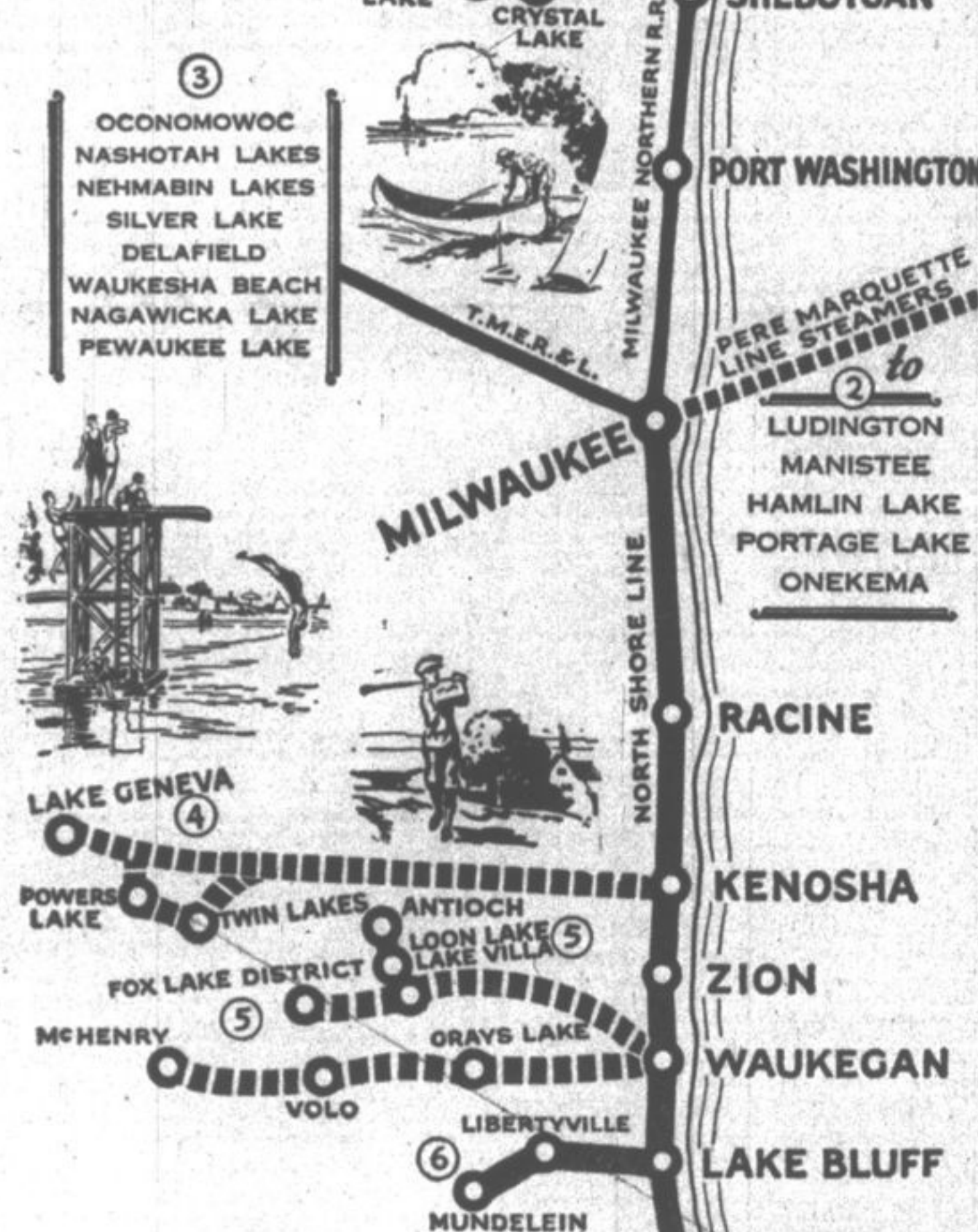

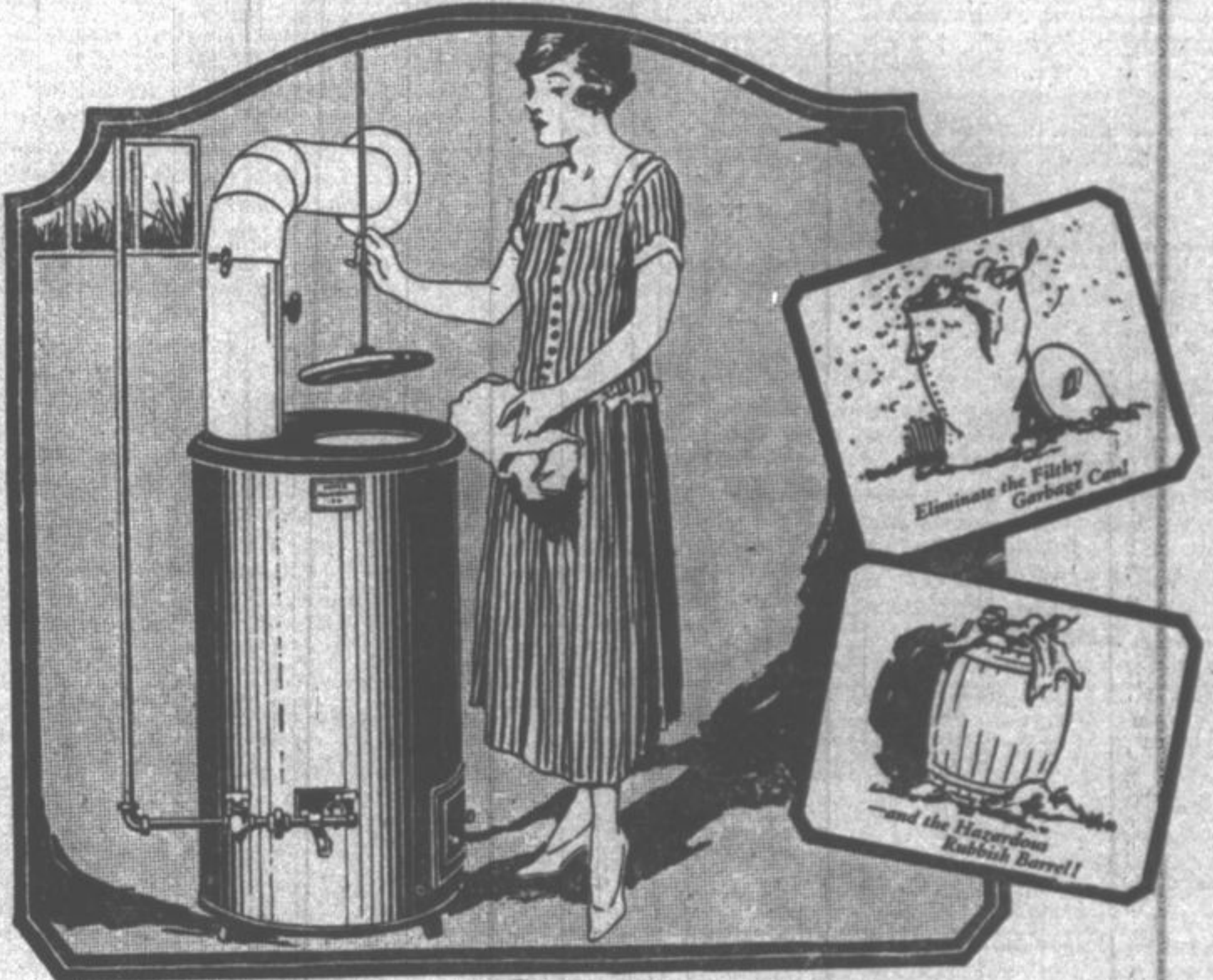
WHERE TO GO AND HOW TO GET THERE via NORTH SHORE LINE



- 1. Elkhart Lake, Cedar Lake, Crystal Lake, Sheboygan, Port Washington: connections at door of our Milwaukee terminal with Milwaukee Northern trains for these points. Through tickets.
2. Michigan points—Ludington, Manistee, Hamlin Lake, Portage Lake, Onekema: Take North Shore Line to Milwaukee; Pere Marquette night steamer from there; arrive Michigan next morning. Through tickets.
3. Oconomowoc, Nashotah Lakes, Nehmabin Lakes, Silver Lake, Delafield, Waukesha Beach, Nagawicka Lake, Pewaukee Lake: Take North Shore Line to Milwaukee—step into T. M. E. R. & L. trains at door of our Milwaukee terminal, for these points. Through tickets.
4. Lake Geneva, Twin Lakes, Powers Lake: Take North Shore Line trains to Kenosha; comfortable North Shore Line Motor Coaches operate from there, on regular schedule, to these points. Through tickets.
5. Antioch, Channel Lake, Loon Lake, Lake Villa, Grays Lake, Volo, Fox Lake, Resorts, McHenry: Take North Shore Line Motor Coaches from there on regular schedule to these points. Through tickets.
6. Libertyville, Mundelein: North Shore Line to Lake Bluff where connections are made with trains on our Libertyville-Mundelein division. Through tickets.
