## Memorial Services

Against a background of red, white and blue, Deerfield honored its soldier dead of all wars in a two-day celebration.

Sunday morning, in St. Paul's Evangelical church, reverent ceremonies with an appropriate Memorial day program; the true spirit of pledging memory to the war time dead, was carried out. Mr. F. A. Hudson of Libertyville, principal speaker, gave an inspiring address.

The central point in the two days' ceremonies was the Memorial day parade headed by the A. L. Taylor post of Chicago whose bugles and throbbing drums aroused the war time spirit and memories of those who have fallen in battle for their country. Following in line was Deerfield post No. 738 of the American Legion, Legion Auxiliary, Boy Scouts, school children and civic organizations. Services were held by the Deerfield post at the Deerfield cemetery. Address was given by the Rev. Gwyn, rector of St. Laurence Episcopal church, Libertyville, ex-Maj. Reed Landis, past post commander, McKinlock post, Lake Forest, also spoke, giving a synopsis of the American Legion. Mr. Landis is also a national officer of the American Legion.

Revs. Williams, Piepenbrok and Andrews were also present. Deerfield post extends a hearty vote of thanks to the owners, who so very kindly loaned their cars, also to the citizens of Deerfield, for their interest and participation in the parade.

The post commander extends thanks to the comrades who so willingly worked toward the success of the parade and ceremonies which resulted in a good day.

Deerfield post also officiated in commemorating the deceased veterans in two other cemeteries at Northfield. Next year the post hopes to have the graves of departed comrades of the late war so marked as to distinguish same.

The floral tributes were numerous and many thanks to the school children and civic organizations.
