Fnancial Condition Excellent

Commissioner Cheney moved that to confer with the county treasurer the corporation counsel be directed regarding payment of amount due the city on account of 1925 tax levy. It was explained in this connection that the county treasurer's office was later this year than usual in turning over the bulk of the taxes due the city, and because of this an erroneous report had got into circulation to the effect that the city was "broke," because the April report showed an overdraft in the general fund. This was because the taxes due the city had not been received at that time. Since then about \$19,000 has been received and now the city has a good balance in all funds, and the city has yet to receive from the county treasurer about \$81,000, which provides adequately for the expenditures of the fiscal year, Highland Park, unlike many other cities, does not anticipate its taxes, and this year its financial condition is better than in the past.

LEARN ABOUTAUTOMOBILE New York Y. M. Technical Adviser Tells How Owner Should Familiarize Himself With His Machine

second-hand value of an automobile which has been in possession of the PLAN TO REMODEL owner but a very short time appears to be excessively low. In a good many new automobile dropping in value after an owner has had it for two weeks. The reason lies in the kind of use the new motorist makes of his machine. In many instances it is not by any means what it should be. probably more difficult for an American to properly break in an automobile than for a person of any other nationality. This is due to the fact that a typical American is apt to be in an awful hurry. The driver of a new motor vehicle cannot afford to be in a hurry. He must constrain his desires to go rapidly from one place to another. There are a number of points to be borne in mind when operating a newly purchased car.

Reasonable Speed

It cannot be over-emphasized that during the first 1,000 to 1,500 miles new automobile should be driven at a reasonable speed. In the case of most cars the manufacturers recommend a maximum speed of 20 to 25

Of course it is important to watch the matter of lubrication. In order to provide an automobile to its owner at the least possible expense, the manufacturers have undertaken to build engines with reasonably smooth bearing surfaces and cylinder walls but they have not in most cases gone through the expensive process of polishing to a glass smooth surface such when the engine is running. Some manufacturers recommend putting a little lubricating oil in the gasoline during the first few weeks of driving-for instance, one quart of medium oil to five gallons of gasoline is sometimes the proportion used. This oil goes into the cylinders with the gasoline and is deposited on the cylinder walls in the combustion chambers, getting a little better working arrangement than otherwise might be the case.

He can also find out at what pressure the car seems to ride most comfortably.

He should watch his consumption of gasoline to see how many miles per gallon it is taking to operate the machine. In this way he will know about how often he needs to put in a new supply of gasoline, which may prevent the inconvenience of finding himself stalled some night on a dark road with his fuel tank empty. This checking up also gives him an opportunity to note if there is any excessive use of gasoline and if so to locate the cause. It also involves getting an adjustment on the carburetor which is likely to give the best results

Like the average pair of shoes, the automobile is not built to the order of the particular person buying it. It however, built closely to specifications as far as the manufacturer is concerned. Consequently it must pass through a certain period of adjustment and during this period small factors may develop, such as the sticking of a window on a closed car or the rattel of a door. Such matters can be remedied easily but if allowed to continue may become a real annoyance to the driver.
