Bids received by the board for the construction of a concrete dance platform to replace the old structure in Sunset Park were all rejected as too high.

MAN KILLED AT RAVINIA CROSSING YESTERDAY

Was Driving Across Track at Roger Williams Ave.; Was Struck By Fast Train

An Italian laborer by the name of Emilis Morciani and in the employ of the Northmoor Country club was struck and instantly killed while driving a two wheeled cart, drawn by one horse, across the tracks of the Northwestern at Roger Williams avenue

Eye witnesses say that the cart was almost clear of the track when struck. The cart was thrown with such force against a telegraph pole on the north side of the road that it severed the pole in two.

NEW SKOKIE VALLEY LINE IN OPERATION

Special Preliminary Trip of Officials and Guests on Friday; Description of the Route

In a special trip over the new Skokie valley route of the North Shore Line last Friday, officials of the road, members of North Shore city councils between Chicago and Milwaukee, newspaper men and other guests were given a demonstration of the completeness of the new line despite the short time since work was started thereon.

The party also was taken through the grounds of St. Mary's of the Lake seminary at Mundelein, where extensive and notable preparations have been made for the coming Eucharistic congress.

The Skokie route includes fifty-eight miles of single track put down in the lush meadowlands paralleling the main line to the west, north of Niles Center, which extension is a part of the route, and the railroad proceeds north to a "Y" that leads back to the main line on the east and to St. Marys-of-the-Lake and Mundelein on the west.

The board instructed its engineers to proceed with an estimate for the condemnation of property for a park east of the track opposite the Ravinia station running north and south on Roger Williams avenue, same to be taken care of by special assessment

JULIUS PETERSON DIES SUDDENLY SATURDAY

Police of Highland Park were called to the office of the Highland Park theatre at 6:40 Saturday evening after Julius Peterson, 37, of Deerfield and Ridge roads, for a couple of years ticket-taker and attendant there, had dropped over, apparently dead from a sudden stroke.

The police upon their arrival found Mr. Peterson alive but evidently dying, and called Dr. Ingalls, who could not reach the theatre until Mr. Peterson had died. The body was moved to the Prior Undertaking parlors.

Dr. Ingalls, who had attended the deceased a number of weeks prior to his death, attributed his demise to mild cardiac with chronic nephritis. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Peterson and a daughter survive.
