

### ELVA JEAN HALL WINS D. A. R. TRIP TO U. S. CAPITOL

#### "Why Uphold The Constitution of The United States" Subject of Essay Contest

First prize of the D. A. R. essay contest, a trip to Washington, D. C., with all expenses paid, has been awarded to Elva Jean Hall of Deerfield-Shields high school.

"Why Uphold the Constitution" was the subject upon which fourteen of our students wrote in competition with the students of Evanston, Elgin, Oak Park, Aurora, Downers Grove, Glenn Ellyn and Joliet high schools.

Marion Rosenstein, as winner of second place in the local contest, will receive ten dollars in gold from the local chapter which would have gone to Elva Jean had she not finished first in the district.

Leaves June 25

Elva Jean, whose trip is paid for by the seven D. A. R. chapters of this district, leaves Chicago June 25 with the winners from each of the other fourteen districts in Illinois. The trip will be personally conducted and chaperoned by members of the D. A. R. and will be made in a special car.

The trip will last from seven to nine days during which time the students will visit every place of interest in the capitol, such as the congressional library, Arlington national cemetery, national cathedral, the White House, and the capitol buildings. Also they will spend a day at Alexandria, Virginia, and at Mount Vernon where they will see Washington's estate.

From there they will return to the capitol by steamer up the Potomac river. Another day will be spent at Annapolis where they will see the old state house, John Paul Jones' mausoleum, and other places. All of the students will be able to meet President Coolidge and see the opening of the senate and the house of representatives.

Aside from the winners, others may go on the trip. They must be friends or relatives of the winner or attend the same school.

### Miss Byrn Gym Teacher Leaves Deerfield-Shields

Miss Margaret E. Byrn, who has taught the girls' gymnasium classes at Deerfield-Shields seven years has resigned from the faculty. She plans to teach in the east next year.

Coming to Deerfield in the fall of 1919 she succeeded Miss Reid and was put in charge of the girls' gymnasium work. During her first year here she inaugurated the Girls' Athletic association which was the predecessor of the D. G. A.

Miss Byrn was very active in the organization of the Illinois League of Girls' High School Athletic associations. The league was founded in 1910 and Miss Byrn served as secretary of the league from 1919 until 1922.

Miss Byrn was graduated from the New Haven Normal School of Gymnastics and taught in Hot Springs, Virginia, before she came to Deerfield.

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### GIRLS BREAK SCHOOL RECORD IN INTERCLASS TRACK MEET

One new girls' school record was established and two marks in new events were established in the three day girls' interclass track meet last week which was won by the sophomore class.

The sophomores scored 44 points, the seniors, 32 1/2, the freshmen 24, and the juniors 10 1/2.

Elizabeth Jaeger Breaks Record  
Elizabeth Jaeger broke the former school girls' running broad jump record by leaping 15 feet 2 1/2 inches. Phyllis Edkins '23 had established the former record of 14 feet 2 1/2 inches in 1923.

Elizabeth also established a mark of 72 feet 10 inches in the basketball throw and Ruth Robbins set a record of 120 feet 8 inches in the baseball throw, both of which events are new this year.

In addition to setting two records Elizabeth was the individual star of the meet, securing 12 1/2 of the seniors 32 1/2 points. Ruth Robbins '23 gathered 10 points and was the second individual star. Three girls, Effie Grim-

son '26, Florence Evans '28 and Ruth Sloan '29 each garnered eight points for their respective classes.

### SUMMER SCHOOL WILL START JUNE TWENTY-FIRST

One hundred and fifty students of the Deerfield-Shields high school, after one week of rest, will start summer school June 21.

Summer school, which will have four fifty-five minute periods, will start at eight o'clock and be in session until twelve of each week-day except Saturday.

In the six weeks of school, ending July 30, students will be able to raise their grade in two review subjects, or they may take one review and one advanced, or with special permission from the office, may take two advanced subjects.

Anyone may go to summer school, but students living outside of the Deerfield or Shields townships must pay a tuition of fifteen dollars.

A semester's credit will be given in any of the nine subjects, if completed successfully.

The following subjects will be taught; mathematics by Mr. George G. Taylor and Miss Eunice Knox; English by Miss Florence Boehmer;

history by Mr. Percy Slocum and Mr. R. C. Platt; Latin by Mr. R. C. Platt; French and Spanish by Miss Emada A. Griswold; commercial arithmetic and mechanical drawing by Mr. Harry Pertz; and typing by Miss Helen Knox.

Because Mr. Sandwick will be in California during the summer Mr. Benjamin Ball will act as principal of the summer school.

### LAKE FOREST WINS HONORS AT BIG MEET

With 39 5-14 points, Lake Forest academy of Lake Forest, Illinois, easily took first place in the Academy division of the Stag field and Field meet held at Stag field and Soldier's field Friday and Saturday of last week.

Following up their custom, the Academy athletes took first, second and third in the discus throw for a total of 12 points. In the last four years they have amassed 37 points in this event, more than all the other 20 or so schools competing in the meets combined.

Hobby, with firsts in shot put and javelin, seconds in discus and high jump, and fifth in the 440, was easily the individual star of the Academy division at the meet.

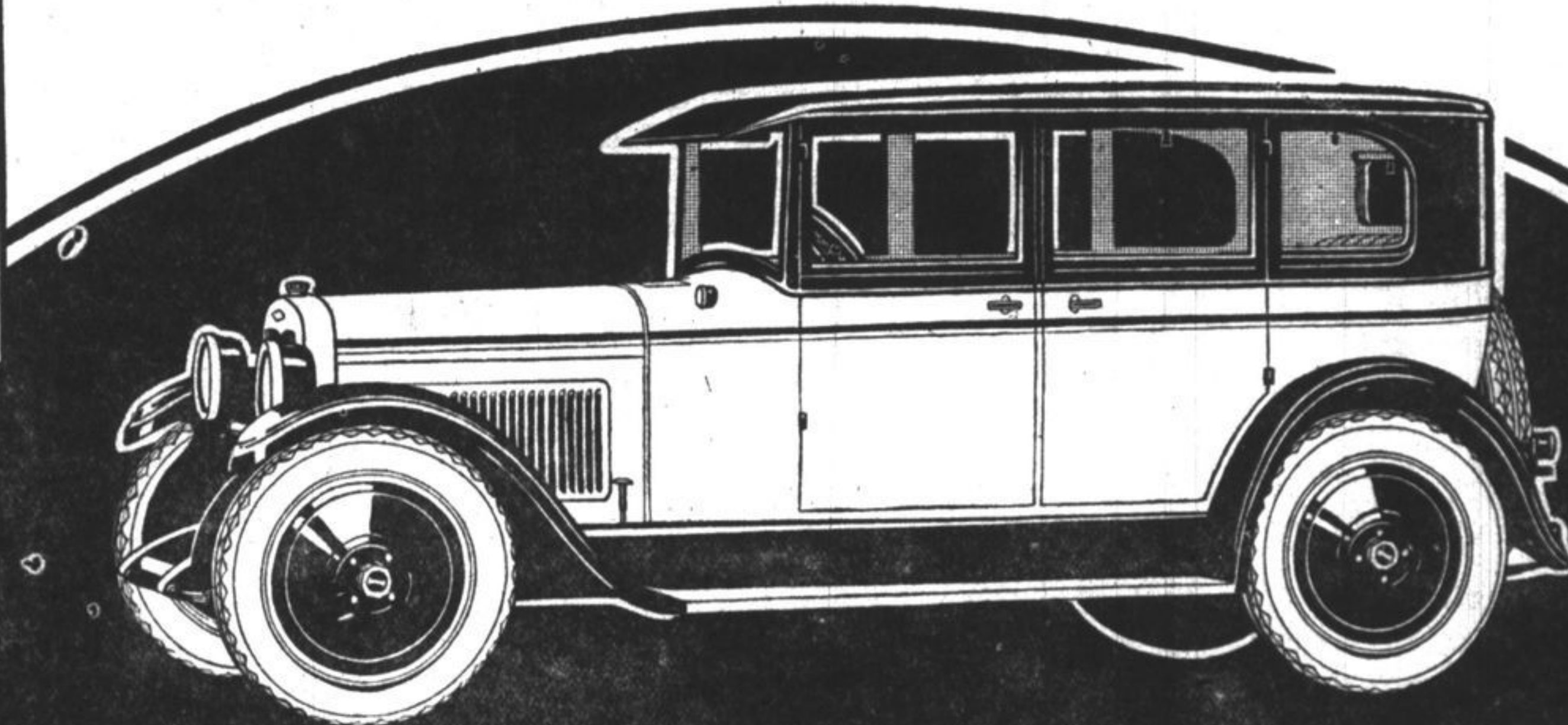
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
