LIFE SAVING EXAMINATIONS**

Nine senior and nine junior boys took the Red Cross life saving examinations last Thursday and Friday afternoon in the high school tank.

Robert Mann, Davis Greene, George Rogers, Claire Balke, Raymond Best, Jack Croke, Dudley Onderdonk, Oscar Anderson, and Berthil Berg took the senior examination.

Harold Bloomfield, Peter Grimson, Garland Kehoe, James Bond, Conrad Newman, Benjamin Gallop, Charles Bond, Albert Snite, and Joseph Ruzwick took the junior examinations.

At least six hours of preparation and practice, being able to disrobe in the water and swim 100 yards, surface dive in six to eight feet of water repeating various objects three times and a ten pound weight once, and resuscitation are a few of the requirements for the junior life-saving award which is an emblem for a bathing suit and an enamelled pin. Persons from 12 to 17 years of age may try for this badge.

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Senior requirements are the same plus a few more such as a theme of 300 to 500 words on resuscitation and being able to carry and lift the patient out of water. Persons 17 years of age and over may try for this award which is a large badge for a swimming suit and a gold pin.
