Mr. and Mrs. John Bensley of Chicago were the week-end guests of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Selig.

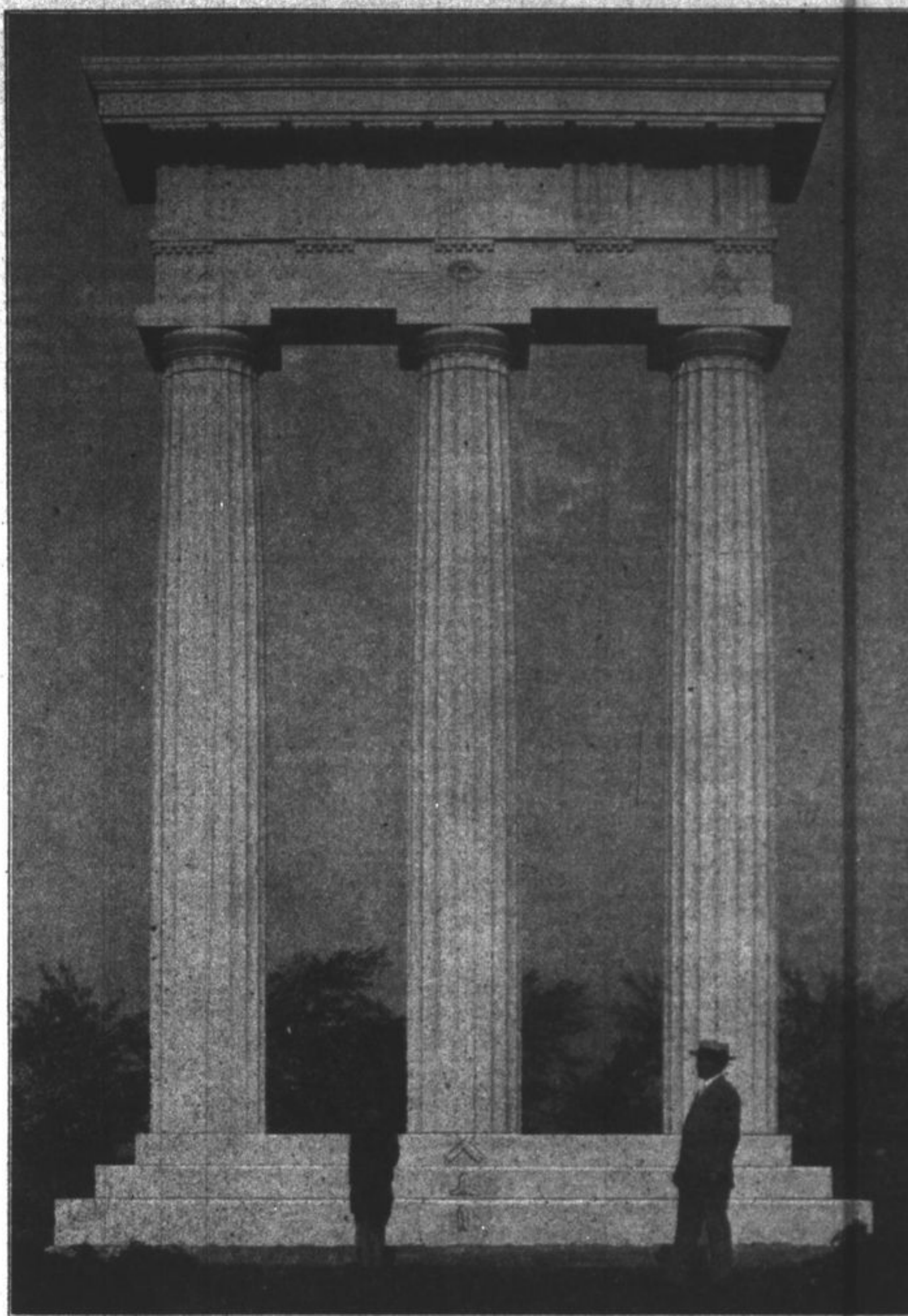
