THOMAS WHIPPLE DUNBAR GALLERIES
Recent Establishment of High Artistic Standard in Chicago

One of the most recent establishments of high artistic standards is the Thomas Whipple Dunbar Art galleries, located at 360 North Michigan avenue at the junction of the new Wacker drive and the bridge. The spacious galleries occupy the second floor of the London Guarantee building, one of the finest buildings in Chicago, and are entered through the main entrance up a flight of stairs of travertine marble.

There are a series of galleries draped with velour and warmly carpeted which give an atmosphere of quiet hospitality, and the exhibitions of paintings, old furniture, tapestries, brocades and velvets, which are constantly on view, make the place unusually interesting.

The Interior Decorating department is conducted on a broad and liberal plan, the policy being to meet the needs of the client, whether it be in the furnishing of an entire home or supplying an individual piece of furniture or hanging a set of curtains. Miss Charlotte W. Remington, recently from New York, is in charge of this department.

Paintings and bronzes by our well-known American artists are always on view. Such men as Hawthorne, Dougherty, Eaton, Wyant, Murphy, Weir, Keith and Ritschel among our painters, and Janet Scudder, Mabel Conkling, Parsons, Beach, Horn, Hollister, Sewell, Bingham, Hyatt, Fris-muth, Konti, among our sculptors are always represented.

A comprehensive collection of Simon prints and other color etchings, blacks and whites, mezzotints, and block prints is available.

The special exhibition at present comprises several wonderful tapestries of the 17th and 18th centuries and Spanish, French and Italian brocades and velvets of the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries. Seldom has a collection comprising so many large and rare pieces been seen in Chicago and a cordial invitation to visit the galleries is extended. This is the well-known collection of Madame Henriette of Paris, who has exhibited in Chicago on several previous occasions.

GRAYSLAKE MAN GETS HIGH STOCK PRICE

Wm. Lang of Grayslake made an outstanding sale of light steers at the Chicago market June 1 when he cashed a fancy shipment of his own feeding at \$10.35 per hundred, top of the trade and highest price paid for yearlings in some weeks. There were 15 head in the shipment which averaged 1050 pounds and were as sleek as show steers. They were western branded Herefords which had been bought at the same market in September and after light graining for several weeks went on feed. They nearly doubled their weight in the eight months of feeding. The sale was made with 11,000 cattle reported on the market, which contained numerous corned lots of light stock but none to match the top price.

CATHOLIC DAUGHTERS GUIDES FOR CONGRESS
Will Have Charge of Information Department; Local Women Aiding

Delegates and pilgrims to the Eucharistic congress which begins in Chicago shortly will be greeted by local courts of the Catholic Daughters of America who will distribute pamphlets containing information about the congress and full instructions concerning registration and transportation.

Girls from different courts of the society throughout Chicago and suburbs will be stationed at railroad stations, elevated stations and automobile roads to distribute these pamphlets, which will be printed in 20 different languages. The Catholic Daughters of America have been given complete charge of the information booth and the supplying of guides to visitors to the congress.

More than 5,000 women have volunteered to act as guides during the congress, of whom 1,000 can speak different languages, and these will act as interpreters to the delegates from abroad.

Members of the local courts who will take part in these arrangements are Mrs. Edith Warren, grand regent of St. James court, Highwood; Mrs. Elizabeth O'Flerty, vice-regent and Mrs. Susan Borrell, chairman of committee representing St. James court. Choruses from several catholic churches will sing at the mass to be solemnized on Soldiers' Field on the second day of the congress.
