BIG ZION BUILDING DAMAGED BY FLAMES

Huge Frame Structure Menaced With Destruction Monday; Fire Controlled

A blaze, started either by defective electric wiring or from a blow torch used by painters to burn off the old paint preparatory to repainting the old Zion Home, started the huge wooden structure on fire at about 10 o'clock Monday morning and threatened to level it to the ground. Valiant and effective fire fighting on the part of the fire departments of Zion, Waukegan and Kenosha finally centered the blaze in the old tower and was there battled into submission.

Hundreds of residents, largely members of Wilbur Glenn Voliva's Christian Catholic Apostolic church in Zion, were driven from the many apartments in the building and furniture was carried and thrown from the windows and strewn over the streets and adjoining lots.

Voliva's apartment, in the south end of the building, which is in the process of remodeling to the extent of about \$50,000, was untouched by the flames and the costly furnishings were undamaged either by water or moving.

Fire damage, almost exclusively centered in the tower which supports the 5 ton bell, was limited to about \$1,500, according to Alderman O. W. Farley, Zion insurance agent. Fire Chief Theodore H. Becker declared the total damage from fire and water would amount to about \$15,000.
