

be Miss Sarah Brewster, Miss Emily Art Institute Lecturer States That American Homes Are Without Privacy

wholly without privacy, was the statement made by the Art Institute Extension lecturer, Dudley Crafts Watson, at the last lecture of the season, in Fullerton hall. It is true, said the speaker, that the American residence is usually surrounded by a lovely lawn. The American builds his house far back from the walk, and if he has a corner lot, well back from the side street. In these open spaces he will plant trees, shrubs and flowers and they will all be the property of the public at large even more than his own. The owner of the average American home has no garden spot to which he can retire and feel comfortable and at ease, free from the curious eyes of the passers-by. The lecturer then made a plea for the style of home to be found in England, France, Spain, and Italy, Build your home close to the side walk. Put your kitchen and servants' quarters next to the walk and your living, dining, and bed rooms in the rear of the house. Then build a wall of some kind either of poplars or of a high-growing hedge around the sides and rear of your lot. This will shut you out from the noise of the street. The speaker doubted whether there were a half-million people in all Chicago who enjoyed a single quiet moment in the whole twentyfour hours.
