PLAN IMPROVEMENT OF COUNTY LINE RD.

To Be Paved This Fall From Green Bay to Sheridan and Widened

Contracts are to be let this fall, it is said, for the paving of County Line road from Green Bay road east to Sheridan road, at which time it is also planned to widen the County Line road.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Glencoe village board of improvements at its adjourned meeting last week, in the form of a communication from D. M. Campbell, supervising engineer of Cook county, calling to the attention of the board that the county intends to let the contracts for the foregoing improvements on September 8.

Mr. Campbell also stated that he would like to know if the city of Highland Park and the village of Glencoe will agree to widen their twenty-foot pavement by adding a twenty foot pavement on the north, which is in the city of Highland Park and whether the village of Glencoe would add a twenty foot pavement on its side of the road, so that when completed the pavement would be forty feet in width.

There was some discussion of the subject by the board, after which, on motion of Trustee Sager, receipt of the letter was ordered to be acknowledged by village manager H. H. Sherer and the matter left in his care for further investigation and report.

LOBBELL NEW SUPT. COUNTY HIGHWAYS

Temporary Appointment to Fill Office Vacated By C. E. Russell

R. M. Lobdell, of Elgin, who has been connected with the state highway department for several years and who inspected most of the state aid road work in Lake county has been named to succeed Charles E. Russell as county highway superintendent.

The appointment is a temporary one, an examination is to be held during the next 90 days for the office. Following the examination the board will select one of the candidates for a six year period.

County Clerk Lew A. Hendee is informed in a communication from Frank Sheets, state highway engineer that C. R. Miller, state director of the department of public works and buildings, had made the temporary appointment to fill the vacancy in the Lake county office. It was indicated that Lobdell will assume the duties of county highway superintendent this week.

JAPANESE GIRL WINS TROPHY ON FLAG CREED

Fumie Yanagisawa Will Enter American Legion's National Essay Contest

The following article appeared in a recent issue of the Christian Science Monitor.

Fumie Yanagisawa, 13-year-old Japanese school girl, is very happy. Her creed on the American flag has won a silver trophy, the California state prize in the American Legion's national essay contest, and the right to compete in the finals in which the first prize is \$1500.

"My father and mother were born in Japan, but I am a native of this land of the Stars and Stripes, so I am glad to be an American citizen," said little Miss Yanagisawa in an interview.

Asked how she wrote the prize winner, she said, "In our English class we first found out what a creed is. Our teacher read us several creeds. We observed the structure. She also read us every poem and speech about the flag that she could find. We made a list of words and phrases that we liked about the flag. We wrote exactly what the flag meant to us and what we would do for it. Then we tried to write our creeds in the shortest and most beautiful way we could. I thought about mine for almost a month. I finally had one that suited me, and this is it:

"I pledge allegiance to you, Flag of my United States, in word and deed. I believe that you will help me to be a loyal citizen in peace and war. I believe that you will lead the world not only in strength but in righteousness; I believe that your stars are the shining symbol of the eternal brotherhood of man in this world. 'Old Glory,' as I stand and salute your heroic colors of red, white and blue, I promise to follow your ideals of 'liberty, justice and peace,' not only for America, but for the world."

OBJECTIONS TO TAX RATE IS OVERRULED

County Judge Perry L. Persons has ruled on the tax objections of the Chicago and North Western and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad companies, the objections with one exception being overruled in both matters. Assistant State's Attorney Sidney H. Block handled the tax matters for the office of County Treasurer Ira E. Pearsall.

The Chicago and North Western road raised two main objections, one that a rate of 14 cents assessed by the county on each \$100 valuation was excessive and the other that the road could not be assessed for bond issue taxes and road and bridge taxes. The court overruled the objections on the bond issue tax, which involves taxes amounting to \$2,558.49. The court upheld the road and bridge objection which amounted to \$886.43.

Pay \$87,269.17

The North Western road paid taxes of \$87,169.17 to the county treasurer several weeks ago and objected to taxes of \$3,448.92. The judgment of the court was that this railroad company pay \$2,558.49 of the tax on which objections were made.

In the case of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad company the court overruled the objection on the 14 cent bond issue tax as in the North Western case. The court upheld the objections to township taxes, which were made on the grounds that spreading of additional taxes was done after the time limit had expired.

The Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road paid taxes of \$66,773 and objected to taxes of \$3,870.51. By the ruling of the court most of the taxes to which objections had been made will have to be paid.

Assistant State's Attorney Block says that the railroad companies were satisfied with the rulings and that no appeals will be taken.
