

SUPERVISORS PLAN MUCH ROAD WORK

Provide For Retiring of Highway Bonds; Provide For Construction

The county supervisors last Thursday adopted a resolution in connection with the \$730,000 road bond issue which was recently passed by the voters of Lake county, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax. The bonds are to be retired at the rate of \$38,500 each year.

A second resolution was passed on the road bond issue project authorizing the finance committee to advertise and sell the bonds. The sale of the bonds is to be approved by the board at an adjourned session to be held Thursday, July 15 at 10:30 a. m. Following the sale of the bonds contracts for road work provided in the bond issue will be let.

The board passed a resolution empowering the road and bridge committee to advertise for bids for the paving of Green Bay road north of Waukegan, this road to be the first paved out of the bond issue money. Green Bay road is to be paved from Yorkhouse church to the state line. Providing work gets under way the latter part of July as planned, the road will be finished in the fall, according to Supervisor George Bairstow, a member of the road and bridge committee.

A resolution was passed providing that the county superintendent of highways prepare plans and specifications for paving of Milburn road, being State Aid route 14 from Grand avenue to Hickory Corners and Deerfield road beginning with federal aid route 42 and extending westerly 3 miles. The road and bridge committee is to advertise for bids on paving of this road as soon as possible. It is believed contracts for paving these roads will be started after the Green Bay road improvement gets underway.

Another resolution was passed providing that plans and specifications be prepared for paving as many roads as possible this summer.

Count Skrzynski has been invited to be the new foreign minister of Poland. We don't know anything about the good count except that you have to have hay fever to be able to pronounce his name.

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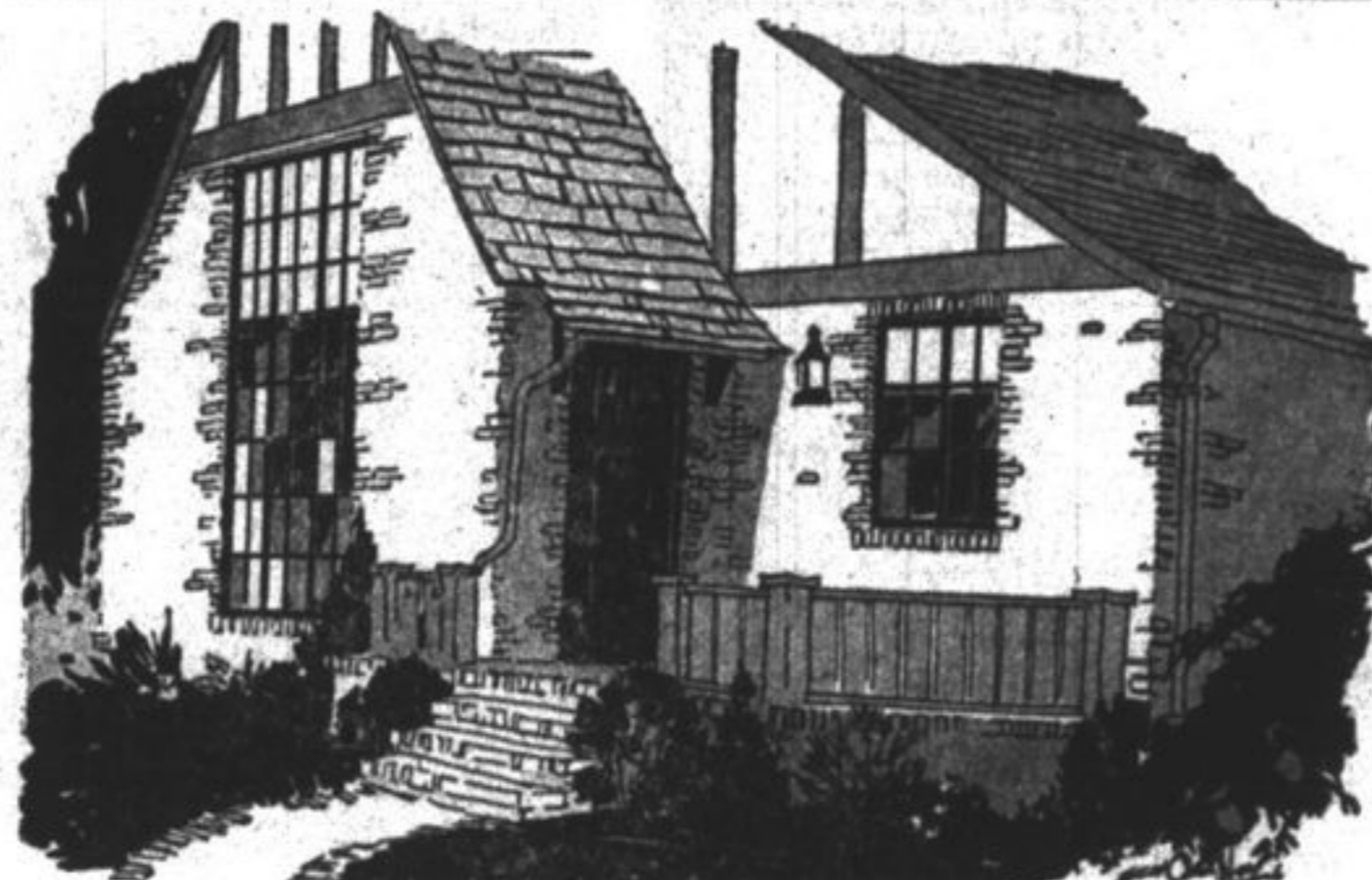
