STUDENT ATTITUDE TOWARD RELIGION IS OBSERVED IN SURVEY
Interesting Facts Obtained by Investigation at Northwestern University Are Reported

Some definite facts regarding the student time survey recently taken at Northwestern university, Evanston campus, have been compiled and interpreted. E. Wight Bakke, who has just been graduated from Northwestern, in co-operation with C. De Witt Norton, secretary of Northwestern university, Y. M. C. A., have been working on the returns contributed by students to this questionnaire.

"The most reassuring and, at the same time, the most surprising figures were those disclosed by the tabulations on religious life and activity. Classified under this head are such items as attendance at church services, young people's meetings, participation in church social service projects, teaching Sunday School classes, personal study and meditation," they report.

Religious Vacation

"The notion is abroad that a majority of our young men and women take a religious vacation upon entering college. According to these factual studies quite the contrary appears to be the real state of affairs. In the course of a given week it was found that fully seventy-two per cent of the student body gave some attention to things distinctly religious. These statistics do not include Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. meetings and service projects, which would shove the figures up still higher.

"It was also discovered that the men and women compare favorably in their religious participation. The women, however, hold a slight lead. Non-sorority women and non-fraternity men show a better religious record than the members of sorority and

fraternity groups. Comparatively few students take an active part in religious work."

Interested in Religion

The analysts found, in other words, that while Northwestern students are interested in religion, attend church and perform good deeds, not a great number devote their entire lives to religion. In the social life at the university, Messrs. Norton and Bakke discovered that out of every 100 sorority members, "only one reports no social life in the course of the week" and that figures of the men are almost identical for fraternities.

"Obviously enough, the social pace, with all that it implies in time, money, clothing and standards, is set by the men and women who can boast of membership in a college fraternal organization," they concluded.

INCREASING NUMBER OF AUTO ACCIDENTS

The increasing number of motor car casualties deserves the immediate attention of public officers. This is not a brief for the creation of a new supervisory federal board or division, but it is written with the hope that the local officials in each and every community will appreciate their responsibility, for it is they alone who have the power to curb the increase in reckless driving on the public highways.

In 1925 there were 22,500 fatal accidents in the United States, an increase of ten per cent over the total in 1924. In 1924 motor vehicle death rate per one hundred thousand increased five per cent over 1923. Deaths of children under 15 years increased from 6,000 in 1924 to 6,200 in 1925. Wholly apart from the economic loss through the violent deaths of men, women and children by motor accidents, we cannot ignore the sorrow, grief and the hardship which these deaths impose on the members of the afflicted families. The American craze for speed seems in danger of becoming a disease. It demands that local highway officials check it.
