Said to Be Show Place of the North Shore Especially In Summer

Mr. Western is a member of the American Rose society and has been studying the subject for years; but this latter statement is equally true of practicaldy all phases of landscape work. In North Shore cemetery there are roses named after many prominent persons

both in Europe and America. It is too big a task to try to describe in a short article the many other charming blooms the evtraordirary foliage color effects, the velvety lawns, the bird homes and bird baths, the unequalled administration building with its rockbound lily and goldfish pool in front, or other features which charm the visitor.
