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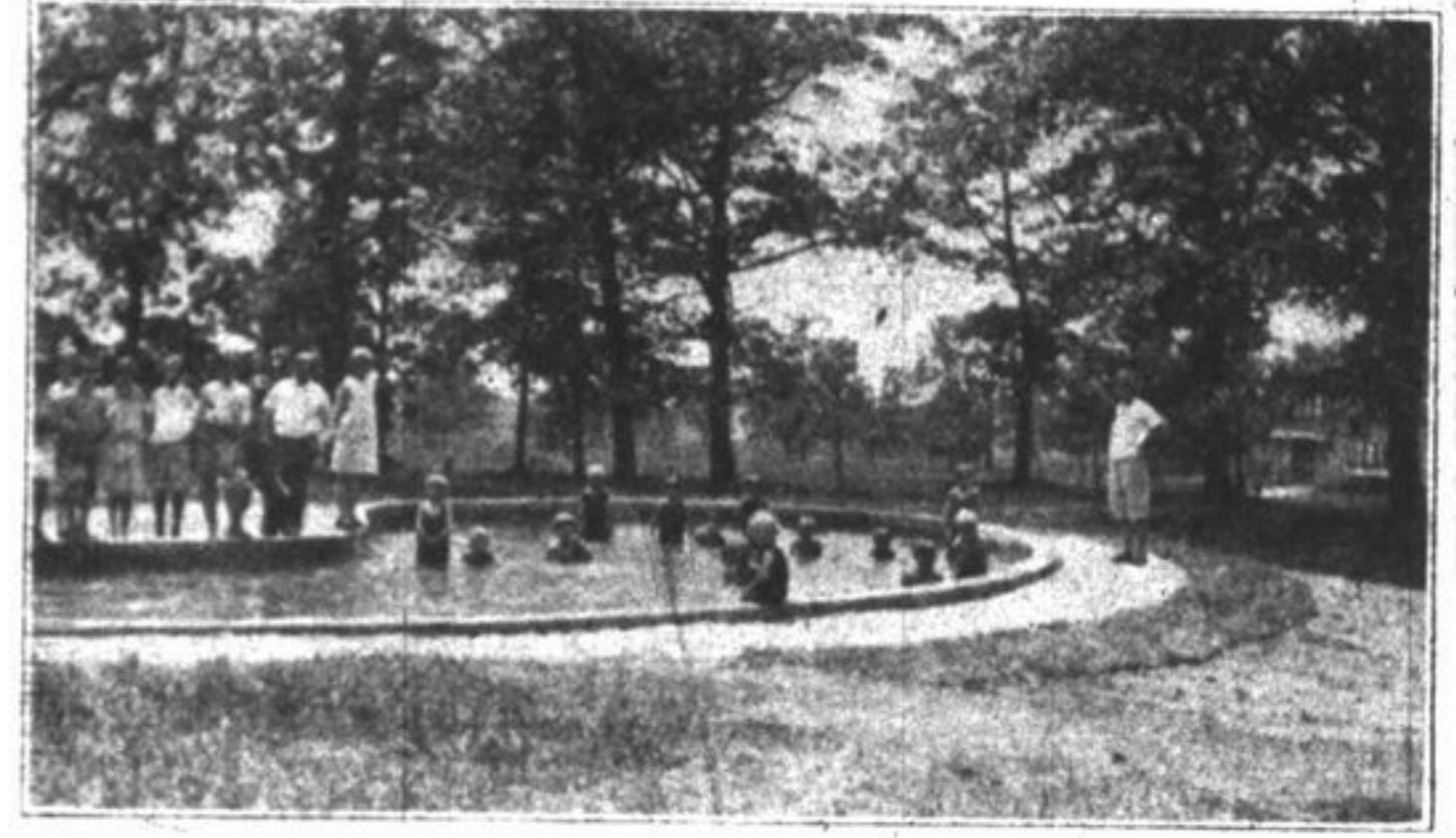
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Pool and Playground

**Pageant for Children**  
Thursday afternoon, July 29, will be a red-letter day for the children, this bringing the annual carnival and pageant under the direction of Miss Bertha Iles. This year the pageant is entitled "The History of Chicago" and scores of children will participate. The carnival will bring forth a variety of attractive costumes, artistic groupings and dances. It will be held on the north campus. All children 12 years of age or under will be admitted free to the carnival. Seats are free for everyone.

"Tosca" will be given its initial presentation of the season on Thursday night, July 29, when Mme. Elisabeth Rethberg will be heard in the title role, Edward Johnson will be cast as Cavaradossi and Giuseppe Danise will be Scarpia. The power of Mme. Rethberg's voice combined with its tonal beauty, makes her ideal as Sardou's heroine in which she must rise to climax after climax, and one can readily imagine the manner in which this singer will render the immortal "Vise d'arte," one of the greatest of operatic arias. Mr. Johnson is likewise admirably endowed to portray Cavaradossi, in which singing and acting are demanded in equal proportions and the hero must make an impression every instant. With Giuseppe Danise as Scarpia, there is much to look forward to. It is a matter of pride that this artist added this role to his repertoire at Ravinia some seasons ago, and he has been tremendously successful in it ever since. Mr. Danise possesses the art of bel canto singing in unlimited degree and he has his own way of presenting the villainous Scarpia, in which he sets him forth as a polished gentleman of evil nature. Mr. Trevisan will be the Sacristan, Mr. D'Angelo the refugee and Mr. Curci, Spoleto. Mr. Papi will conduct.

**"Samson and Dalila"**  
A deluge of requests from his patrons have caused Mr. Eckstein to include "Samson and Dalila" in the

coming week's repertoire and this monumental work has been scheduled for Friday night, July 30, with Giovanni Martinelli again as Samson and Alice Gentle as Dalila. **Route of Parade**  
The parade will start from Dale and Central avenue and proceed to Green Bay road thence North to Elm Place, where the foot parade, marching organizations and children will enter the Park from Elm Place. The automobiles, etc., will continue north on Green Bay road to Park avenue, west on Park avenue to Sunset road, south on Sunset road to Central avenue, east on Central avenue to Green Bay road, south on Green Bay road to Lincoln avenue, west on Lincoln avenue to St. John's, north on St. John's to Central avenue, west on Central avenue to Second street, north on Second street and disband or park on North Second street with the exception of the floats who may, if they desire proceed to Sunset Park where parking space will be provided for exhibition purposes.

**Many Prizes**  
Besides the big principal prize, about \$500 worth of other prizes donated by the local business men and others will be available and everybody is urged to register early and often for the distribution of these premiums.

The ball game between Highwood and the Highland Park Elks at 2:30 o'clock will be a snappy one with widespread interest on both sides, as the teams are old rivals and both have won many games this season.

The Elks band and the High School band will be in the parade and furnish music during the day. It is also hoped to arrange for the Camp Roosevelt boys and their band to participate in the parade.

The games and athletic events start at 2:00 o'clock and include the following:

Prizes given for the oldest man and the oldest lady on the grounds.

**Decorations**  
The work of placing the permanent flag decorations secured by the Chamber of Commerce has been started, and also the wiring for the special street illuminations. In addition the business people are urged to decorate the windows of their stores and shops so that the entire business district may be in gala attire. Three prizes of \$5, 10, and \$15 are announced for best decorations. Citizens also are requested to display flags and other decorations on their premises.
