#### LAKE CO. NINTH IN U.S. IN PAVEMENT

COOK CO. LEADS IN STATE

Supervisors Move to Push Building of New Bond Issue Highways; Several to Be Started Soon

Lake count ystands ninth in entire county in mileage of paved roads and second in Illinois, according to Roy Salzman, field engineer

for the Portland Cement association. The Illinois Lake county stands second to Cook, a county much larger in area and with far greater funds to draw from in the way of taxes. Still it leads the other counties in state, although several are larger in population and many are greater in

The fact that Lake county, which is small compared to many, stands ninth in the United States is an

achievement in itself. The \$730,000 bond issue, recently passed, moved it up to this position in ranks.

**Push Bond Issue Roads** The last legal obstacle to spending the \$730,000 bond issue for county roadways was cleared away last week when the board of supervisors empowered the road and bridge committee to ask for bids and sign contracts on all roads under the bond issue. Bids had been asked already for

Green Bay road and the Wadsworth road, but there were a number of others still pending.

R. M. Lobdell, county superintendent of highways, stated that he would like to pave two other strips besides Greenbay and Wadsworth road this summer and fall if possible.

Improvement Near Deerfield There is a piece between route 20 and route 21, running through Grayslake and a strip running out of Deerfield west nearly to the township line that he would like to complete before cold weather hits. Both are small jobs and could be cleared to one side if legal obstacles were cleared aside.

The Grayslake strip is to be widened as the greater part of its bears traffic of that village. The village is to stand a share, it is understood. Other Roads on List Other roads to be covered under the \$730,000 issue that will be started the first thing in the spring are:

Millburn road, which runs from Grand avenue, through Millburn, connecting with the Zion-Antioch route. This is a long strip.

Milwaukee avenue, route 21, to Bel-Round Lake-Long Lake road, run-

ning from the present end of concrete in Round Lake to Graham's corners near Long Lake.

And the Ivanhoe road, running from Ivanhoe to Grayslake.

#### CROWN PRINCE HAS INTEREST IN ARTS

Pays Two Visits to Institute In Chicago and Expresses His Appreciation

The Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf of Sweden on his first formal visit to the Art Institute in the forenoon of June 24th, expressed a wish to return later in the day and give a little more time to the study of the collection, particularly those of Oriental art. An arrangement was therefore made which the Prince was to return at o'clock and complete his inspection. Promptly at the appointed hour the sirens of the Chicago motorcycle police escorts sounded on Michigan avenue and the Prince's party drew up in front of the Art Institute. He was met by Charles Fabens Kelley, curator of Oriental Art, and escorted to the Oriental galleries in McKinlock court. He proved himself an intelligent observer, as he is well-known as an archaeologist and a discriminating collector of objects of art. He viewed the rare and valuable Chinese stele. the great stone shaft, which has recently been installed in the galleries, and which the Art Institute has secured and expressed admiration for the quality and extent of the collection of Cambodian sculpture. 
