

**SLOT MACHINES ARE
RAIDED IN COUNTY**

**Several Found But Not of Type
Protected by Injunction,
Report Says**

Slot machines in the county were made the object of raids by the sheriff's office Saturday night. Three of the contraband machines were seized by the raiding officers.

At one place near Fox Lake, the sheriff's squad found a quarter slot machine. At another place, near Fox Lake, the raiders found a quarter machine and a nickel machine. The proprietor, was charged with gambling with slot machines.

At present there is an injunction in effect restraining the law from interfering with the slot machines of a certain company which has gum or peppermint as prizes for money put into the slot. A case in which this sort of machine was up for a ruling was tried in court a couple of years ago. The Sheridan Park hall, Waukegan, was the defendant in the action and won out. Since then the machines of that certain company have been protected.

The machines that were seized by the sheriff's office Saturday are alleged to be manufactured by a different company and ran in a different manner.

**LARGEST ELECTRIC
LOCOMOTIVE SHOWN**

Is Exhibited at Sesquicentennial Exposition; Some of Its Features

The largest and most powerful electric locomotive in the world has been installed for exhibition in the Palace of Transportation at the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, Philadelphia.

Built by the General Electric Company for the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway to haul its Olympian and other Chicago-Seattle trains through the Rocky Mountains and the Cascade Mountains, the giant locomotive left Tacoma, Washington, a month ago on a journey of 3,000 miles to reach Philadelphia. Because of its immense size it was necessary to make several detours to reach Philadelphia, as movement under bridges and through tunnels of the direct route was impossible.

The locomotive is known as the bipolar gearless type and operates from an overhead trolley. It is seventy-six feet in length and has twenty-four driving wheels. Twelve motors placed directly on the driving axle propel the monster. The cab is in the center.

George C. Lincoln, Philadelphia representative of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, and Frank J. Newell, traveling passenger agent, who superintended the installation of the exhibit, declared that by utilizing the natural resources of the mountains, the use of electrical energy created by water power has brought about a saving to the railroad of 265,000 tons of coal and more than 35,

The work of hanging more than 12,000 paintings in the Palace of Fine Arts at the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, now being held in Philadelphia, was completed on July 10, according to an announcement by John Frederick Lewis, a member of the Executive committee of the exposition.

The paintings, which cover every conceivable subject, represent the labors of artists in all parts of the United States and foreign nations. The pictures chosen for exhibition in the immense gallery, which is a part of the Palace of Fine Arts, were selected by a committee from many thousands offered by the artists of the world.

**FISH RESCUE WORK
HEAVY THIS SEASON**

Recent Floods, Cause, According to Director of Conservation Stratton

Fish rescue work will be unusually heavy this year due to the recent floods, according to a statement issued by William J. Stratton, director of conservation.

Work will be started soon along the backwaters of the Illinois, Mississippi, Kankakee, Sangamon and Kaskaskia rivers and some other flooded areas. Mr. Stratton in explaining the plans for rescue and distribution stated that the state superintendent of fish rescue is now making a survey of all water courses in the state. Wherever any fish are left in landlocked ponds by the receding rivers they will be seined out and put into the rivers or used to stock hatcheries and inland lakes and ponds.

Eight crews of four to ten men have already been employed for this work at advantageous points along the different rivers. Due to the recent unusual flood conditions they will probably be kept busy all summer. It is estimated that more than a hundred carloads of fine fish will be saved and distributed this year. Many more will be moved by trucks while thousands will be returned to the rivers where the ponds from which they are taken are not accessible by hard roads or railroads.

This work has been greatly increased during the past few years. At the same time eight artificial and natural hatcheries have been purchased and put in operation. This important work of saving millions of fish does not cost the tax payers one cent as all expenses including distribution are paid by revenue from fishing licenses.

**USE NO SOAP AFTER
VARNISHING AUTO**

Until Four of Five Weeks, at Least, Says Bulletin by Motor Club

"For the first four weeks after a new varnish job has been applied to a car, no soap should be used," says a bulletin issued by the mechanical first aid department of the Chicago Motor club. "The car should be showered with cold clear water, and a soft sponge used to loosen the dirt. Care must be taken not to drag the chamois over the varnish in drying. Subsequently not only the best soft soap must touch the finish, and that soap must be entirely dissolved. This can be done quickly through a fine mesh bag.

"If the finish on the car is dull and lifeless it should be washed with suds and rinsed with clear cold water, and allowed to dry without the use of chamois which would dull the finish; then a fresh tone should be applied to the old varnish, a pleasing brightness being the result."

**FRANK G. LOGAN IS
HONORED BY FRENCH**

Invested With Insignia of the Gallic Academy of Fine Arts Recently

Frank G. Logan, honorary vice-president of the Art Institute of Chicago, was signally honored by the French government on the occasion of the seventy-ninth commencement exercises at Beloit college, Wisconsin, Monday, June 14. The Insignia of French Academy was conferred upon Mr. Logan and Mr. W. W. Tyrrell, of Delavan, Wisconsin, both trustees of Beloit, by M. Didot, French vice-consul to Chicago. The decoration was conferred for the extensive research work in the auregnacian deposits of southern France and in the French possessions of northern Africa, which Dr. Logan financed for Beloit college, and in which extremely valuable relics of the art of primitive man of 75,000 years ago were discovered. Many of these relics were brought to America and are now in Logan Museum at Beloit.

**ESTIMATED WEALTH
OF NEGROES IN U. S.**

The present estimated wealth of Negroes in the United States is \$2,000,000, according to a recent survey made for the Research Section of the American Sociological Society by Dr. Monroe N. Work, of Tuskegee Institute. The wealth of the group, in 1912, was estimated at \$700,000,000. The race has also made decided gains in the matter of health. The death rate, which was 22.9 per thousand in 1912, has now fallen to 15.7, or a decrease of 31 per cent.
