VALUES ESTIMATED

#### Assessment List Shows Total Value, Real and Personal Over 19 Millions

The personal property and real estate values in the city of Waukegan reach a total valuation of \$1,184,830 more than they did for the year 1925, was the startling announcement of Assessor Charles O. Armes today as the tax assessment books for the year 1926 were completed and the huge totals compiled. According to this year's figures the full value of real and personal property within the confines of the city limits is \$19,160,950 as compared with the \$18,070,700 for

last year. The valuation increase is largely in real estate owing to the annexation of a vast territory to the city during the year. Personal property valuation increase was almost negligible, showing only \$3,378,280 this year as against \$3,330,140 for 1925. The total personal property valuation includes \$139,130 for the telephone and telegraph companies and \$6,050 for the railroads. The total assessed valuation for the city, on which the basis of the taxation is figured, is one-half of the full valuation or \$9,632,995 as compared with the \$9.035,350 assessed valuation last year.
