ness of the predictions of those who
were of the opinion that this role
would be a masterful addition to his
repertoire. Mme. Elisabeth Rethberg,
who as Madeline, completely won
her audience by the sheer beauty of
her voice and the thrilling of her
dramatic interpretation will again
have this role and Giuseppe Danise,
who finds Gerard one of the greatest
parts of his repertoire, will be cast as
the revolutionist. Others in the cast
are Mme. Bourskaya, Miss Paggi,
Mr. Defrere, Mr. D'Angelo, Mr. Mo-
jica, Mr. Ananian and Mr. Derman.
Mr. Papi will conduct.

Same Cast
The special performance of "La
Vida Breve" announced for Monday
night, Aug. 16, will again bring to
the Ravinia stage the same cast
which has made this melodious and
atmospheric work one of the out-
standing features of the season.
Mme. Lucrezia Bori will be heard as
Salud, the gypsy girl, a part which
presents this artist as an unusual
actress as well as a brilliant singer.
Her characterization is without doubt
one of the greatest contributions ever
made by any opera star to the im-
personations of the lyric stage, for
in it Mme. Bori has the opportunity
not only to sing her native tongue,
but to depict a type with which she
is thoroughly familiar. Opposite
Mme. Bori is Jose Mojica, who is
likewise Spanish and who enters en-
tirely into the spirit of his role. Mme.
Bourskaya will be heard in a detailed
character part, as will Louis D'An-
gelo. Others in the cast are Mr.
Defrere, Mr. Ananian and Mr. Der-
man. The ballet, which is a feature
of this work will be headed by Ruth
Page. Mr. Hasselmans will conduct.

"Aida," which is always a favorite
with all opera audiences, will be given
on Tuesday night, Aug. 17, with
Elisabeth Rethberg in the title role,
and Giovanni Martinelli as Radames.
As the Egyptian slave girl, Mme.
Rethberg has the opportunity to dis-
play her dramatic voice to its full-
est extent, and the arias which fall
to her lot also demand that beauty of
tone for which Mme. Rethberg is
famous. Giovanni Martinelli enjoys
universal acclaim as the greatest Ra-
dames of the present day and like
his vis-a-vis, he combines dramatic
singing and tonal beauty with admi-
rable mastery. Marlo Basilio is to be
heard as Amonastro, one of the great
baritone roles of opera; Leon Roth-
ier will be Ramfis, the high priest,
and Louis D'Angelo the King. Mme.
Bourskaya will have limitless chance
for both singing and acting as Am-
neris. Mr. Papi will conduct.

Messner's "Manon," one of the
finest exemplifications of the French
school of composition, will be the of-
fering on Wednesday night, Aug. 18,
with Lucrezia Bori again in the title
role. This part demands unusual
singing and acting, and Mme. Bori
has fully demonstrated her ideal fit-
ness for the role. Marlo Chamlee
will appear opposite her as the
young Des Grieux, in which his beau-
tiful lyric singing has captivated his
audiences. Leon Rothier will be cast
to excellent advantage as the elder
Des Grieux. Others in the cast are
Margery Maxwell, Ada Paggi, Phil-
ine Falco, Desire Defrere, Louis D'-
Angelo, Jose Mojica, Papi, Ananian,
Louis Derman, Carlo Coscia, and Vir-
gilia Grassi. Mr. Hasselmans will
conduct.

Children's Concert
Another gala event has been ar-
ranged for the children on Thursday
afternoon, when they will hold their
annual child artists' day; the pro-
gram being given by juvenile music-
ians selected from among those who
attend these weekly children's con-
certs and entertainments. Those who
will appear on this program are Mil-
dred Waldman, pianist; John Horn,
cellist; Harry Mazur, violinist, and
Saul Dorfman, pianist. All children
twelve years of age and under are
admitted free to these concerts. Re-
served seats are free for everyone.

Thursday night, Aug. 19, "The
Love of Three Kings" will be given
by the same cast which has distin-
guished this stately Montezzi work
this season. Mme. Lucrezia Bori will
be heard as Flora, one of the most
trying of all soprano parts, while op-
posite her will be Edward Johnson
as Avito, a noteworthy dramatic role.
Marlo Basilio will be cast as Man-
fredo and Lazzari will have the su-
perb character part of Archibaldo.
Miss Falco and Mr. Mojica are well
cast. The score of this work is out-
standing in its beauty, and this coup-
led with the splendor of its singing
and the drama of its situations, has
made it one of the favorites of the
Ravinia repertoire. Mr. Papi will

"Fra Diavolo" Friday
"Fra Diavolo" that tickling op-
era bouffe which is universally liked

is sheer romance without enough of
seriousness to it to give it solidity,

Mario Chamlee in the same part.

First Double Bill
The first double bill of the season
will be presented on Saturday night,
Aug. 21, when "Pagliacci" is given
in conjunction with "Cavalleria Rus-
ticana". No opera in the entire reper-
toire is more universally loved than
"Pagliacci" and this is a work which
makes such strenuous demands that
it requires a cast of special ability to
do it justice. Ravinia has such a
cast with Elisabeth Rethberg as Ned-
da, Giovanni Martinelli as Canio, and
Giuseppe Danise as Tonio. Jose Mo-
jica will be Beppo and Desire De-

frere, Silvio. Mme. Rethberg is given
broad opportunities as Nedda for
both singing and acting, and the
beautiful arias assigned to this role
will serve to bring out the magnif-
icent lyric quality of her voice. Mr.
Martinelli will be well remembered as
Canio in which he has been heard in
the season past. This is a part made
to his measure and he enters into the
very soul of it, as witness his stir-
ring singing of the far famed "La-
mento." Mr. Danise as Tonio brings
the individual touch to bear and one
could search every corner of the ar-
tistic world before finding an artist
better able to do justice to the "Pro-
logue," than this celebrated bari-
tone. Mr. Papi will conduct.

"Cavalleria Rusticana" is one of
the most popular operas. Alice Gen-
tle as Santuzza shares the lead with
Mario Chamlee as Turridu. Alfio
Paggi takes the part of Lois and Anna

Correnti appears as Mama Lucia.
