AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE BORROWING OF MONEY AND THE ISSUING OF \$8,000.00 INCINERATOR PLANT BONDS FOR THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF A DIRECT ANNUAL TAX FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS.

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Highland Park has found that it is necessary for the best interests of said City, that the present garbage incinerator plant be improved by building an addition thereto and equipping the same with modern equipment; and

WHEREAS, the assessments of the cost of such improvements are in excess of \$8,000.00; and

WHEREAS, this City has insufficient funds to pay such costs, and it is necessary and for the best interests of the city that it borrow money and issue bonds for \$8,000.00 to pay for such improvements;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1. That there be borrowed by and for and on behalf of the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, the sum of \$8,000.00 for the purpose of improving the present garbage incinerator plant of said City by constructing an addition thereto and equipping the same with modern equipment. That to evidence said loan, negotiable coupon bonds of said City be issued. Said bonds shall be designated "INCINERATOR PLANT BONDS", shall be 8 in number, numbered from 1 to 8, inclusive, of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each; shall bear date September 1st, 1926, and shall become due and payable in accordance with the following schedule:

Said bonds shall bear interest from the date thereof until paid at the rate of four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September in each year, which interest payments to the date of the maturity of the principal shall be evidenced by proper interest coupons attached to each bond and maturing on the dates herein provided, and both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the Harris Trust & Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois. The seal of said City shall be affixed to each of said bonds, and said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Clerk, and said coupons shall be signed and attested by said officials, respectively, by their facsimile signatures, and said officials shall, by the execution of the bonds, adopt as and for their respective proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons; that said bonds be payable to bearer.

SECTION 2. That each of said bonds and each of the interest coupons to be thereto attached shall be in substantially the following forms:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS. That the City of Highland Park, in the County of Lake and State of Illinois, acknowledges itself to owe and for value received hereby promises to pay to bearer, or if this bond be registered, then to the registered holder hereof, the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) on the First day of September, 1926, together with interest on said sum from the date hereof until paid at the rate of four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the First days of March and September in each year upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they severally become due and payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the Harris Trust & Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois. And for the prompt payment of this bond, both principal and interest, as aforesaid, at maturity, the full faith, credit and resources of said City are hereby irrevocably pledged.

This bond is issued by said City for the purpose of improving the present garbage incinerator plant of said City by constructing an addition thereto and equipping the same with modern equipment, pursuant to and in all respects in compliance with an Act entitled "An Act to provide for the incorporation of Cities and Villages," approved April 10, 1872, and all acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and an ordinance duly passed by the Mayor and Council of said City and submitted to and approved by the voters of said City at an election duly called and held for that purpose.

And it is hereby certified and recited that it appears from the records of said City that all acts, conditions, and things required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Illinois to exist or to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have existed, and have been properly done, happened, and been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law; that the indebtedness of said City, including this bond, does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation; and that provision has been made for the collection of a direct annual tax, in addition to all other taxes, on all the taxable property in said City to pay the interest hereon as the same falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal hereof at maturity.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the said City of Highland Park, by its Mayor and Council, has caused its corporate seal to be hereto affixed, and this bond to be signed by its Mayor and attested by its City Clerk, and the coupons hereto attached to be signed and attested by said officers respectively, by their respective facsimile signatures, and said officials do, by the execution hereof, adopt as and for their proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons, all as of the First day of September, 1926.

SECTION 3. That for the purpose of providing the funds required to pay the interest on said bonds promptly when and as the same falls due and to pay and discharge the principal thereof at maturity, there be and there is hereby levied upon all the taxable property within said City in each year while any of said bonds are outstanding, a direct annual tax sufficient for that purpose, and in addition there to, a direct annual tax sufficient for that purpose, and in addition to all other taxes, the following direct annual tax, to-wit:

- For the year 1926, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,360.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1927, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,315.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1928, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,270.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1929, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,225.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1930, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,180.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1931, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,135.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1932, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,090.00 for interest and principal;
For the year 1933, a tax sufficient to produce the sum of \$1,045.00 for interest and principal.

That interest and principal coming due at any time when there are insufficient funds on hand to pay the same be paid promptly when due from current funds on hand in advancement of the collection of taxes, and when said taxes shall have been collected, reimbursement shall be made to the said funds in the amounts thus advanced.

PERSHING ENJOYED CROSSING THE LINE

Delighted With Frolic of Old Salts as Ship Passes Over Equator

How General Pershing witnessed the ceremony by which all men crossing the equator for the first time aboard a United States Navy ship are initiated into the Brotherhood of Shellbacks is vividly told by Captain John W. Thomason, soldier-author, who was captain of the detachment of Marines aboard the U. S. S. Rochester which took General Pershing to South America.

Captain Thomason writes in the August Scribner's Magazine "Crossing the Line With Pershing," in which he says: "In these latter days of economy and short enlistments, the navy does not cruise continually. Most ships are manned by crews largely landlubbers—in the Neptune sense. Shellbacks are not so abundant. In this crew the Neptune party had three hundred to mishandle, and, pleasantly stimulated by the commissioned personnel, they went to it. They cast off all restraint and did not weary.

"The general of the armies was there, extremely happy, with his aides and his diplomats and his experts all politely amused. The admiral was awfully diverted; the captain and the commander let joy be uncensored. Even the first lieutenant viewed with good nature the grease and corruption that fouled his fine white necks. The Neptune party, warmed up, functioned like a machine. Quivering neophyte was hailed before the court: Davy Jones, scribe, read his name, rate and sin; the royal electrician shocked him; the royal officer lubricated him; the royal barber lathered him; the royal barber lathered him from head to foot with deckwax of paint, tar, and goo, and the polypwogs held him in the chair while neapless

SEVEN PRECINCTS OF THE SAID CITY HAVE BEEN CREATED AND DESIGNATED THE FOLLOWING BOUNDARIES, TO-WIT:

First Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of the City of Highland Park which lies west of the center line of the right of way of the Chicago & North Western Railway Company and northerly of the center line of Central Avenue and Deerfield Road in said City (except that portion of the territory included in the Seventh Precinct).

Second Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of the City of Highland Park which lies west of the center line of the right of way of the Chicago & North Western Railway Company and southerly of the center line of Central Avenue and Deerfield Road in said City.

Third Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of the City of Highland Park which lies east of the center line of the right of way of the Chicago & North Western Railway Company, south of the center line of Central Avenue and north of the center line of Beech Street in said City.

Fourth Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of the City of Highland Park which lies east of the center line of the right-of-way of the Chicago & North Western Railway Company and south of the center line of Beech Street in said City.

Fifth Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the East Quarter corner of Section 9, Township 8 North, Range 12 East of Third Principal Meridian; thence West on the East and West Quarter line of aforesaid Section 9, and on the East and West Quarter line of Section 8, Township and Range aforesaid, to the center of aforesaid Section 8; thence South on the North and South Quarter line of aforesaid Section 8 and on the North and South Quarter line of Section 7, Township and Range aforesaid, to the center of Section 17; thence East on the East and West Quarter line of aforesaid Section 17 to the Northeast corner of the Northwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of aforesaid Section 17; thence South on the Quarter line of the Southeast Quarter of aforesaid Section 17 to the Southeast corner of the Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of the aforesaid Section 17; thence East on the South line of aforesaid Section 17 to the corner of Sections 17-16-21-20, Township and Range aforesaid; thence south on the west line of Section 21, Township and Range aforesaid, to the Southwest corner of aforesaid Section 21; thence East on the South line of Section 21, aforesaid, to the Southeast corner of said Section 21, thence north on the East line of Sections 21, 16 and 9, Township and range aforesaid, to the place of beginning; all in Lake County, Illinois.

ELECTRIC APPLIANCE SAVES HOUSE LABOR

Results of tests recently made show interesting comparisons between household labor before and after installing electric appliances, according to Dr. G. I. Christie, Purdue university. Three examples, follow:

Ironing—Pedometer showed one woman walked at rate of thirteen miles a year between ironing board and range (separated only 5 feet) before electric iron was used. Washing—Time consumed in weekly laundry work reduced from six to three and one-half hours in one case by substituting 1 kilowatt-hour of electricity for drudgery of hand labor. Lighting—Cleaning and filling kerosene lamps on one farm required one full year of twelve-hour days during a period of 40 years.

SIGNS SAY "STOP" AT STATE HIGHWAYS

Under an act of the last general assembly the state highway department has erected signs at all crossroads along state highways requiring motorists to bring their cars to a full stop before crossing or driving onto the state road.

These signs are distinctive in character and have a high visibility, being painted in black and yellow. Efforts are being made by state authorities to secure general observance of the law.
