Dr. Harry Douglas Hull, husband of Cathryne Hull Breyspraak and Marie Cathryne Hull Breyspraak and Marie Hull Wagner, who died last week and was buried Thursday with military honors in the Crystal Lake cemetery, was a Highland Park boy, and lived next to the old Baptist church. His wife was a member of the first graduating class of the Deerfield-Shields high school.

The Raffens family had several daughters. Marie married Arthur Seaverns, a druggist in Crystal Lake; Mrs. Seaverns was left a widow.

Dr. Hull was surgeon for the Chicago and North Western railroad, and had been practicing in Crystal Lake for about thirty years.

During the World War he served as a surgeon in the army.
