Recently there appeared in the public prints two reassuring and important statements by men in high official positions and widely separated by distance. In England, Sir Thomas Luskin, Member of Parliament, is quoted by the Christian Science Monitor as having declared: "We neglect the Bible at our peril. It is the chart and compass without which the path of any man or any nation is a perilous and disastrous adventure." A few days later, speaking at a community meeting held by civic organizations of the Calumet region of Illinois and Indiana, near Crown Point, in the latter state, James J. Davis, Secretary of Labor in President Coolidge's Cabinet, urged upon the American people the wisdom of clinging steadfastly to the faith which they have inherited, and that veneration for the Bible which has been the basis of national character and national steadfastness. He declared that he did not regard seriously the assertion that the people are beginning to lose the fruits of Christian experience and Christian teaching, that they are losing their faith in immortality, and that they are ceasing to venerate the Bible. "It is probable," he declared, "that there never was an age when more people believed in religion than believe in it today."



I hereby certify that the above is a true statement of cash receipts and disbursements for the month stated, and that the cash balances on had th's date are deposited to the credit of the city in duly authorized depositories.

This statement shows the financial condition of the Treasury of Highland Park on July 31, 1926. You note the star (*) on cash balance under the "general" account, which means overdrawn (\$10,955.70). The water revenue for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1926, was \$61,125.89. \$24,564.65 was collected from water rates from May 1, 1926, to July 31, 1926, and this amount was placed in the "general" account. The appropriation for running the water department this year is about \$33,000.00. It is selfevident the water department is self-supporting if the income is kept in the water works

account. The other three accounts, "Garbage, Public Benefits and Sewer," have cash balances to their credit totaling \$5,066.42. If you subtract this amount from the overdraft in the "general" account, there is a net overdraft of \$5,889.28, taking into consideration all of the general funds of the city.

You will notice that the city has spent on July 31, 1926, \$5,889,28 more than it had received into the treasury from all the enumerated and miscellaneous sources at that time.
