culated relative to the project at the eleventh hour.

Mayor Talks
Mayor Hastings said that the administration realized when the Sheridan road bridges were closed that the action would result against the bond issue. He made that statement at Ravinia Friday night and added that the administration, after hearing the rather shocking report of Engineer Fyfe that it was better to close the bridges at once rather than jeopardize lives.

In the meantime, the mayor said yesterday, that while the new ordinances are being prepared, etc., it may be necessary to issue water certificates to take care of the improvements to that plant, and incinerator improvements similar. The Sheridan road bridges are still closed, and the indications are that they will stay closed until some plan is devised to make them safe permanently. The mayor and administration officials generally are confident that when the bond issue project is again submitted the voters will understand the necessity better and support will be adequate.

Unofficial Report
The official canvass of the vote will be made by the city council on Friday evening. The unofficial report omits the vote on the incinerator bonds in the Third precinct. With the result in this omitted, the total vote for and against the bond issues are unofficially reported as follows: Sheridan road bridge—For, 187; against, 586.

General corporate bonds—For, 237; against, 483.
Water works bonds—For, 319; against, 409.
Incinerator bonds—For, 320; against, 334.

Majorities against the bond issues: Bridges, 399; general corporate bonds, 246; water works bonds, 90; incinerator bonds, 14.
