PEDESTRIANS CHIEF VICTIMS OF AUTOS

Involved In 70 Per Cent of the **Fatalities from This Cause** During 1925

cidents collected from 80 cities 1925 by the National Safety council shows that pedestrians are involved in nearly 70 per cent of all fatalities due to motor vehicle accidents.

This summary covers 6,120 deaths and 145,000 injuries, approximately one-third of the total for the entire country. In addition to the 70 per cent involving pedestrians 10.8 per cent were due to collision between motor vehicles, 5.6 per cent to automobile accidents not involving a collision, 4.7 per cent to collision between motor vehicles and street cars, 3.5 per cent to collisions between motor vehicles and some fixed object, 2.7 per cent to collission between motor vehicles railroad trains and 2.9 per cent to collision between motor vehicles and

Pedestrian accidents also represent approximately 55 per cent of the total number of fatal personal injury accidents according to this investi-

By far the greatest number of pedestrian accidents were due to the fact that the pedestrian was walking. running or playing in the street, or the driver did not have right-of-way at intersections. Next in importance was crossing the intersection against the signal, or crossing the street not at the intersection, or the driver of the automobile was exceeding the speed limit or driving on the wrong side of the street.




