

MUCH GAME STILL FOUND IN ILLINOIS

MANY SURPRISES FOUND Deer, Wolves, Coyotes, Foxes Often Seen; Come in from North; Smaller Game Is Plentiful

Illinois, the Prairie State, in spite of her highly developed agricultural and manufacturing interests, her nationally famous hard road system, and her population of six million people, has many surprises for the nature lover and sportsman.

Authentic reports prove that several bands of deer are living and increasing in number each year in the timber regions of the state. From within a hundred miles of Chicago, in Winnebago, Jo Daviess and Ogle counties, come reports of two or three of these herds having been seen. One bunch of thirty or forty deer has its range in Fulton and Peoria counties, along the Illinois river.

Wild Turkeys
While no deer have been seen in the southern part of the state, wild turkeys are still fairly plentiful in the Wabash and Ohio river bottoms, with a few scattered along the lower Mississippi.

Wolves, coyotes and foxes are a real menace to livestock, poultry and game. Having come in from Wisconsin and across the Mississippi on the ice three years ago, they have spread to practically every county in the state. That they have adapted themselves to life in civilized communities, is shown by records of various counties. Both wolves and coyotes have been killed this summer within fifty miles of Chicago. More than twenty have been captured, and one bunch of twelve timber wolves has been found less than forty miles from Springfield.

Predatory Animals
Pike, Adams and Hancock counties on the west, Kankakee and Will on the east, Ogle and all of the northern counties, and Sangamon, Morgan and Menard counties in the central part of the state, lead in the number of these predatory animals that have been killed this year.

Fox hunters have formed several organizations and the Central Illinois Fox Hunter's association will stage a field trial at Ramsey from September 20 to 24 this year. More than nine hundred fur dealers were issued licenses to buy and sell furs last year. Raccoon, opossum, skunk, mink and muskrat are the fur bearing animals of greatest value in this state.

Small Game
Squirrels, rabbits, quail and pheasant in rapidly increasing numbers furnish sport for more than 300,000 hunters. Duck shooting in the Fox Lake district, Mississippi and along the Illinois river, ranks with best in the United States. With our present program of constructive game restoration, Illinois game and wild animals should show a marked increase in the future.

ILLINOIS IS RICH IN WAR MEMORIALS

FOUR FAMOUS STATUES Several of Lincoln; Nearly All Counties Have Markers of Heroes of Civil Conflict at Least

With three great men from the Civil War period commemorated many times in bronze, and numberless memorials to Civil War veterans, Illinois is particularly rich in monuments. Nearly all of the 102 counties in the state contain one or more markers to the memory of the famous dead.

Abraham Lincoln, who has perhaps been commemorated in both stone and bronze more than any other American, receives the major portion of these memorials. His political opponent, Stephen A. Douglas, and his general, U. S. Grant, are the other two men to whom statues and shafts of stone have been liberally dedicated.

Four Famous Statues

Four famous statues of the martyred president are found in the state. Lincoln's monument and tomb at Springfield is the place of one of these, and has become a place of pilgrimage for admirers of Lincoln from all over the world. In front of the state capitol at Springfield is another statue of the great American, this one representing him as he appeared just before leaving Springfield. This figure, executed by Andrew O'Connor, has a marble slab as a background, upon which is engraved Lincoln's farewell address to the citizens of Springfield.

"Lincoln and the Chair," by St. Gaudens, which stands in Lincoln park, Chicago, is said to be one of the finest portrait statues in the world. A replica of this statue now stands on the threshold of the Illinois building at the Philadelphia Sesqui-Centennial. A fourth bronze figure of Lincoln is found in Rosemond, Christian county, picturing Lincoln as delivering his Gettysburg address.

Bronze Figures
Two other bronze figures grace the grounds of the state house at Springfield. One is of Stephen A. Douglas, Illinois' fiery debater, and was unveiled during Illinois' centennial celebration in 1910. The other, erected in 1885, is of Pierre Menard, early

Illinois Indian trader. Ulysses S. Grant, general and president, has two major statues to his memory in the state. One in Lincoln park, Chicago, represents him as an equestrian. At Galena, former home of the general, stands another statue, inscribed "Grant—Our Citizen."

Chicago Has Many
Chicago has two famous statues to Stephen A. Douglas. The Douglas tomb, in Douglas Memorial park, is surmounted by a round granite tower, with a figure in bronze of Douglas on its peak. A 100 foot granite shaft and statue in his memory also stands in Woodland park.

Lesser monuments include: A granite shaft erected in 1914, at Warsaw, commemorating the centennial anniversary of Ft. Edwards. A statue to George Rogers Clark at Quincy.

A monument to Elijah P. Lovejoy, Alton. An Italian marble shaft in memory of Gov. W. H. Bissell, Springfield.

A St. Gaudens statue of General Logan, Chicago. A monument depicting Richard J. Oglesby, former governor, unveiled in Lincoln park, Chicago, in 1919.

E. J. HILLARD, FORMER RESIDENT, PASSES AWAY

Dies in Boone, Ia., Following Accident; Was Well Known Here

Johnson of Belle Plaine; his mother, Mrs. Virginia Patterson, and two sisters, Mrs. L. A. Norrell and Mrs. R. W. Larke of this city, to mourn his departure.

VINE STREET BANDIT KILLED; IDENTIFIED

Joseph Stevens Views Body in Chicago Morgue; Says Man One of Robbers

Joseph Stevens, Lincoln auto salesman, who on Sunday night, Aug. 15, was held up at the Vine avenue North Shore line station in Highland Park and robbed of \$120 in cash and a valuable 21 jewel watch on Thursday, August 19, appeared at the Cook county morgue and identified the body of Conrad Burezicky, 2034 West Eighteenth street, as one of the bandits who robbed him. Stevens also identified Burezicky's partner, Joseph Kugley, who is being held at the Warren avenue station, Chicago, as the other robber who victimized him.

Burezicky was shot to death Wednesday night by a detective bureau squad headed by Sergt. P. B. O'Connell. At the time Burezicky and Kugley were fleeing in a stolen automobile. Kugley is 23 years old and lives at 2218 Cullerton avenue, Chicago. According to Chicago police both men have served terms in the state reformatory at Pontiac.

AGED RESIDENT DIES AT DAUGHTER'S HOME
Mr. Henry Lawrentz, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. S. Santi, in Highwood, Tuesday, August 24, at 3:30 in the afternoon.
