**PLAN EIGHT-STORY CLUB NEAR WILMETTE**

**Breakers Beach, Name of This Probable Improvement in No-Man's Land**

**WINNETKA DAY IS SPLENDID SUCCESS**

**Best Program in City's History on Civic Holiday and Big Crowd Attends**

With the best program that the Winnetka Chamber of Commerce has ever arranged for its annual Winnetka days, the citizens of the village, and their friends for miles around, assembled last Thursday to participate in the day's frolic.

Winnetka day, which is for all Winnetka, Hubbard Woods, and Indian Hill, began in the morning with a parade through various streets of the villages, including a routing through the business section and a portion of the residence district of Glencoe. One hundred and fifty cars, most of them beautifully decorated, comprised the parade column, headed by the Evanston Civic band.

All business houses were closed during the day and the streets of the village in their bright decorations heralded to all visitors a hearty welcome.

**SIGHTSEERS TO BE BARRED AT JOLIET**

**PRISON WARDEN'S EDICT Says Too Many People Swarm Into Penitentiary on Public Visiting Days; Certain Exceptions**

Public visiting at the Joliet penitentiary will be barred after September 1, it was announced today by Warden Elmer J. Green.

A few weeks ago Warden Green set up a rule permitting public visitors to inspect the penitentiary on the second and fourth Mondays of each month.

Monday, Aug. 9, a stream of 1,000 persons passed through the new and old prisons, Warden Green said. Another public visiting day will be permitted August 26, after which date no more public visitors at the penal institutions at Joliet will be permitted.

"The task of taking a long line of visitors through the penitentiary disrupts work in the prison shops," Warden Green said.

**Women and Children**

"Our records show that on last Monday, 510 persons visited the old prison and about the same number at the new prison.

"About 50 per cent of the visitors were women and young children. It would be an easy task for some desperate character to get into the visiting line and attempt to free some of their friends in the prison."

"When a stream of visitors passes through a shop the men do very little work and it is my opinion that public visiting of curiosity seekers does not improve the morals of the men serving time."

The new rule will not affect persons visiting individuals at the prison. A convict who has a good record is permitted to have a visit with relatives once every two weeks, at which time he may eat any articles of food brought to him.

**2,749 Prisoners Now**

Warden Green immediately restricted visiting at the penal institutions after he assumed charge when Warden Whitman resigned.

Records at the penitentiary disclose that the prison population is fast reaching the 3,000 mark. The count last night, including 74 women inmates, was 2,749. Of this number 1,409 are kept at the old prison, 65 at the honor farm and the remainder at the new prison.

Warden Green is using a detail of men from the new prison in harvesting the prison crops of wheat and oats.

New fence will be placed around the state property, Warden Green said, and the farm property improved.

**PROBE SPEED TRAP REPORTS IN COUNTY**

**STATE'S ATTORNEY ACTS**

**Is Co-operating With Motor Club In Matter on Justice Is Apprehended; Like Spots**

A probe of speed trap reports has been opened in Lake county by State's Attorney A. V. Smith and the Chicago Motor club and through investigation will be made in all cases where complaints are made relative to unjust treatment of motorists by police or court officials.

In announcing the opening of the bureau Col. Smith issued a warning to motor cops and justices and magistrates that he will not tolerate outrages against motorists. He said no hesitancy will be shown in causing the arrests of motor cops or court officials when conditions warrant preferring charges against them.

**Other Places**

State's Attorney Smith says that in addition to Winthrop Harbor and Waukegan he is investigating complaints of alleged speed traps in Lake Forest, Lake Villa, Libertyville and Winthrop Harbor. Paul Jensen, police magistrate at Winthrop Harbor is the only official arrested so far in the campaign of the Lake county prosecutor.

**Books and other records of all the justices of the peace and police magistrates of the county have been ordered turned in to the state's attorney's office by State's Attorney A. V. Smith in the latest move to eradicate the "speed trap" evil from the county.**

After the books have been turned in, they will be copied in order to have duplicate records. In the meantime letters will have been sent out to hundreds of motorists asking them for the facts regarding their trials and fines.

**Will Check Up**

When the reports of the motorists are received, they will be checked back against the records on the books. If they tally, well and good; but if they do not, there is something wrong. In Chicago, the investigation has found, there have been wrong entries made. In many cases the judges kept forfeited bonds of \$25 for themselves and marked \$1 and costs on the books.

**Check Jensen's Record**

Attorney Joseph Braun and Auditor Robertson, representatives of the Motor club, made a check of the books of Paul Jensen, police magistrate of Winthrop Harbor. Their findings were not made public.

The case of Paul Jensen was to have come up before Justice Harvey C. Coulson last Saturday, Aug. 21, but was continued one week to August 28. The continuance was at the request of the state which wanted more time to collect evidence.

**ELECTION NOV. 2 FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE, PLAN**

**District in Which Lake Co. Is Will Choose Man to Succeed Reynolds**

The election of a Circuit Court Judge to fill the vacancy left by the death of Judge E. D. Reynolds of Rockford will be held on Nov. 2, according to news dispatches from Springfield. The election will embrace the seventh judicial circuit, which includes Lake county.

Calls for the convention at which candidates will be chosen must be in the hands of the secretary of state by next Wednesday to conform to the election rules which provide for the filing of the convention calls 75 days before the election. Candidates will be picked by a judicial convention made up of the heads of the various county party central committees.
